Automobile petting parties in Waukegan are likely to become less popular as the result of orders given to members of the police department by Assistant Chief of Police Thomas Kennedy, following a communication submitted to the city council by Mayor L. J. Yager in which he decried the practice in no uncertain terms.

Skidding on the pavement, when the driver turned it sharply to avoid striking a speeding automobile, a truck belonging to Thomas J. SOPHOMORES LEAD IN HONOR ROLL AT H. S.

NOTICE is hereby given to all persons interested, that bids for the furnishing of all labor, tools and materials necessary for the construction of a connected system of water mains in Forest Avenue, Golf View Avenue, Melvin Drive, Northmoor Drive and Lincoln Avenue, all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, were opened on the 21st day of November, A. D. 1927, and the Kapschull-Davis Co., Inc., being the lowest responsible bidder, the contract was awarded to the said Kapschull-Davis Co., Inc., on the 12th day of December, A. D. 1927.

Said bid for the work is as follows:
Item No. 1
3910 lineal feet of six (6) inch internal diameter, asphaltic coated, bell and spout cast iron water pipe, weighing thirty-three and three-tenths (33.3) pounds per lineal foot, laid with points of lead and lute. The top of the pipe shall be laid five feet six inches (5' 6") below the surface of the ground, where located; including all trenching, shoring, bracing, rumping, sacking, testing, backfilling the trenches with earth, flushing the backfill, and removal of all surplus excavated materials; laid complete at Two Dollars Twenty Cents (\$2.20) per lineal foot \$862.00

Item No. 2
3120 pounds of asphaltic coated cast iron water pipe fittings, complete, in place at No Dollars Seven Cents (\$0.07) per pound 218.40

Item No. 3
7 cast iron body, bronze mounted, bronze stemmed, double gate water valves for one hundred fifty (150) pounds working pressure, having joints calked with lead and lute, tested, and set in place at Forty-five Dollars No Cents (\$45.00) each 315.00

Item No. 4
7 valve vaults, constructed of monolithic concrete or concrete blocks, 1:2:4 mix. The inside diameter shall be four (4) feet side walls eight (8) inches thick, bottom six (6) inches thick. The bottom shall extend to the out-

side of walls. If constructed of monolithic concrete forms shall be placed on both sides of the walls. If constructed of concrete blocks, said blocks shall be laid with full joints of mortar, 1:2 mix, neatly pointed on the inside with a trowel. Six (6) inch concrete blocks may be used provided a mortar coat one (1) inch thick, of 1:2 mix, is applied to each side of the walls; the top of the bottom of said valve vaults shall be six (6) inches below the bottom of the water pipe. Each vault shall be furnished with an asphaltic coated cast iron manhole cover weighing five hundred forty (540) pounds; including all excavation, backfilling, and removal of all surplus excavated materials; constructed complete at Ninety Dollars No Cents (\$90.00) each 630.00

10 cast iron body, bronze stemmed fire hydrants for a depth of trench of six (6) feet, for six (6) inch connection to water main, with five (5) inch valve opening, with six (6) inch cast iron body, bronze mounted auxiliary gate valve with cast iron box and cover, with two (2) two and one-half (2 1/2) inch Highland Park pattern hose connections, with one

(1) Highland Park pattern sham hose connection, with legs and two (2) one (1) inch wrought iron tie bolts for strapping; including all excavation, calking joints with lead and lute, testing, backfilling, and one-quarter (1/4) of a cubic yard of gravel around each hydrant drip, and removal of all surplus excavated materials; constructed complete at One Hundred Forty Dollars No Cents (\$140.00) each 1,400.00
