The title of the play is "No. 17," and it is said to be one of the best mystery plays ever written. It will be produced on the North Shore during the latter part of January, being presented in local playhouses from Lake Forest to Evanston.

"No. 17" has never been produced in either Chicago or New York. A company of English actors brings it to Boston after a successful run in London. The North Shore Theater guild has been quite fortunate in securing the privilege of first presenting it in this section of the country.

"No. 17" offers a pleasing contrast to the other plays included in this year's program of the North Shore Theater guild.
