AMERICAN PEOPLE HAVE HIGH LIVING STANDARD

The American people last year attained the highest standard of living ever reached in the history of the world, according to a report of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

In 1926 the 117,000,000 people of the United States had a total income of \$89,682,000, an increase of 43 per cent in the five years since 1921. The experts in the Bureau of Internal Revenue stated that this year the national income will equal or slightly surpass that of last year.

Officials believe that during the present year commercial conditions are more nearly normal than at any time since the war. In spite of the increasing standards of living, installment buying, and greater number of luxuries in homes, the American people, on June 30, 1927, had \$36,000,000,000 deposited in savings accounts.

In 1921 the national income was \$62,000,000,000, and has increased every year since. In 1921 the average per capita income was \$1,637 and in 1926 was \$2,210, an increase of 35 per cent.

"This income indicates the highest standard of living for the population of the United States ever attained in this or any other country," the Bureau declared.

"This great increase in income is not the result of an increase in the price level, for the average price of consumed goods was actually less in 1926 than in 1921."

COSTS MORE TO RIDE AUTO THAN RAILROAD

At Least This Is Report of Investigation in Syracuse by Bureau

The cost of buying and operating automobiles in the city of Syracuse, N. Y., was 7.3 times as great as all the money spent for public transportation in 1926, according to authentic data compiled and published by the United States Census Bureau and the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The two organizations are collaborating in making a retail census of distribution in eight American cities which will serve as an index to business throughout the country. The census in Syracuse is the first one completed.

Out of the retail purchase dollar nearly 17 cents goes to automobiling, auto sales absorbing 10 1/2 cents, gasoline 3 1/2 cents and accessories 3 cents. The total retail sales in the city amounted to \$103,000,000, of which \$17,250,000 was spent for purchasing and maintaining automobiles. The total spent for street car and motor coach fares was \$2,355,000—less than one-seventh the cost of automobiling.

LEAVING PHONE OFF HOOK CAUSES TROUBLE

Surprisingly Large Number of Instances of This Kind Are Reported

When a telephone is left off the hook, not only is all inward service to that telephone interrupted, but if it is a party line, it is impossible for the operators to ring any other telephone on the line as long as the instrument is off the hook.

There are a surprisingly large number of cases when telephone service is interrupted in this way. In part of New England alone, for one month recently, 10,556 subscribers were cut off from telephone service for a time because of receivers being left off the hooks.

ERROR IN CALENDAR OF FOUR YEARS SEEN

IN DATE OF JESUS BIRTH

New York Clergyman in Research Finds Christ Really Born in 4 B.C.; Makes 1928 Really 1932

Jesus was really born in the year corresponding to 4 B.C. on modern calendars, which makes the year 1928 really 1932, Dr. Charles Francis Potter, pastor of the Church of the Divine Paternity in New York, has discovered during research into the life of Christ.

"Through an error of late calendar markers, the date of Jesus' birth was set four years too late," says Dr. Potter in the Woman's Home Companion. "As nearly as can be determined, his baptism, which brought him to the height of his own belief, took place in A. D. 26. This event, checked against other records, shows that according to his age at that time, which is fairly well established, he was born four years earlier than ordinarily supposed.

"The baptism of Jesus by John, who protested that he had no sins to repent, was easily the most important event in his life and the date is therefore better established than others, including his birth. His studies had been completed at that time and he was prepared for his work when the clarion call of John rang out upon the startled Jordan side, announcing that the kingdom of heaven was at hand. It was then he retired to the wilderness and found himself as other great religious teachers had done. He reappeared to repeat John's message with an urgency and power that John never knew."

MOTOR HAREM OUTFIT FOR KING OF ARABIA

Fleet of Eight Expensive Cars Made in London for Use of Monarch's Wives

A wonderful motor harem recently glided through the streets of London en route for the desert.

This harem, a marvelous motor caravan, was manufactured in London at the Star works, and was on its way to Arabia.

The man who has helped the King of Arabia to design his new fleet of cars is Stuart Marr, who served in Arabia under Colonel Lawrence.

"The car will carry the royal wives across the desert at 55 miles an hour. The king is constantly making long journeys," says Marr, "from Mecca to Medina and across to the Persian gulf. He naturally wants his wives to go with him. But they must never be seen by men, and the king is very strict about it.

"So these cars—there are two of them—were made to carry his 21 wives from place to place. There are no windows, light being admitted thru opaque glass in the roof. The 12 wives are locked in and an electric fan keeps them cool—more or less. They may have to travel as much as 1,100 miles in there. They sit six aside, on the pile of carpet which is fixed to the floor of the car.

"Two other cars of the same size are open. They are for the king's guard of fifty warriors. Armed to the teeth, these picked fighting men will travel with the king and his wives, and woe betide anyone who gets the way.

"There are also four touring cars for the king and his suite. These will do 65 miles an hour.

"The fleet of eight cars has cost \$55,000. Each car is covered in polished aluminum. Enormous tires, costing \$375 a set were specially constructed to bear the load in the rough desert."
