to learn the effect of the interplay of academic and industrial disciplines at Antioch upon the young men and women exposed to them. Here at Antioch—but read it yourself in the June Survey-Graphic, Antioch and the Going World."

Better still, go and hear President Morgan tell how Antioch college is fitting men and women for life, and what changes should college make in the college student. Mr. Morgan has a clear, crisp style, for example, his interpretation of the next step in education, "a practical recognition of symmetry and the center of symmetry should be the personality of the student."

#### New Educational Phase

Education is in the midst of two great adventures; the discovery of the individual as an individual, and the discovery of human beings in relation to the dusty, hurrying, clattering, beautiful, perilous world in which we live. The college project which approaches a solution from the vocational interest, as the center of the individual life is one of the directions in which education is moving. The actual experiences and concrete examples of boys and girls in their jobs, which Mr. Morgan will tell about in his lecture will give us more definite ideas of that correlation of work with study which is inherent in the Antioch plan.

The Antioch Book Plate Co. produces a large variety of artistic book plates, and the Antioch Shoe project is the most extensive of these college undertakings. For three years a study has been made of women's feet and footwear in co-operation with orthopedists and other health authorities, last makers, manufacturers and retailers. The Antioch shoe, a result of this study, represents an effort to produce a type of women's shoes which is both beautiful and correct in design. In all these undertakings, there is an effort to combine fine workmanship with effective business management.

The subject of President Morgan's lecture here will be "What Should College Do for Life?" The lecture

will be given in the high school auditorium, January 5, 1928, at 8:15 p. m. It will be worth hearing.

south through the central part of the city, and that the present street communications are inadequate and unsafe for the local and through traffic through the business centre;

"Now therefore, be it resolved, that the Plan Commission respectfully request the city council of the city of Highland Park to authorize the mayor to appoint a committee to investigate and report upon the feasibility of opening a direct route north from Central avenue and Elm Place along the easterly line of the right-of-way of the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railroad, to connect with Chicago avenue at Orchard street, or to widen St. Johns avenue north from Elm street to the same point; and also to investigate and report upon extending North Sheridan road south to connect with St. Johns avenue, across Laurel avenue and the vacant property at the southeast corner of Laurel avenue and St. Johns avenue, by condemnation proceedings or otherwise.

#### Seeking Permit

The council is seeking the permission of the state department of public works and buildings to make connection to the twelve-inch water main at Deerfield road and Windsor road, which by law comes under the jurisdiction of the state department in question, and in this connection a resolution was unanimously adopted requesting said permission and pledging the good faith of the city that all work shall be performed in accordance with conditions prescribed in the permit when issued, the city to bear the cost and to hold the state department harmless on account of any damages which may occur; also that the work will not be done by employees of the city.

Commissioner Brown moved that N. M. Steenhil be granted an extension of time on his permit for building to be erected at the corner of Ravine terrace and Ravine drive in accordance with the terms outlined in a communication of the building inspector dated December 15, 1927. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Zimmer moved that the communication of the building inspector with reference to the Cummings' home at 125 North Green Bay road be referred to the corporation counsel for report. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Reay presented bills and pay rolls covering the period from November 1, 1927 to December

1, 1927, and moved that the same be approved and vouchers for payment be issued for the several amounts. The motion prevailed. The bills aggregated \$7,495.31.

#### Board Gets Bids

At the meeting of the board of local improvements two bids were received for the installation of a connected system of water mains in Sunset Manor, Golf Links, Deerfield Villa and first addition to Deerfield Villa subdivisions. The bidders and bids were: Highways Construction Co., \$32,511; E. A. Meyer Construction Co., \$31,643. The bids were filed for inspection.

The board also approved three estimates of money due contractors on work done and ordered payment.
