PROF. A. E. MORGAN SPEAKER AT P. T. A

new appraisal of the chief issues of life, and of personal qualities which best will meet those issues; and then seeks to give that emphasis to the development of each quality which it deserves in relation to all other qualities. The Antioch purpose is to bring about a balanced development of character, intelligence, and power. He is best fitted for modern life who holds his beliefs as tentative, and subject to continual revision . . . In the relentless competition of custom and tradition for lodgment in men's minds, education is the great selective agency. If it does its work well, superstition, prejudice, bad taste, vulgarity, and indulgence are crowded out, and intelligence, integrity, critical inquiry, good will, self-control, and a sense of beauty find room. Only as education makes wise selection can the best values survive . . . We can leave our children no safer or better heritage than a society in which there is fair play, in which worth can find its reward without the need of breaking down vested bar-

Prof. Morgan, before becoming an educator of distinction had won recognition in his profession of civil engineer. In this field he is best known 16, 1859, and was aged 68 years, ten for his achievements in controlling the Miami river so that there has been no recurrence of the devastating the surrounding territory suffered in 1913. He has, in fact, planned and superintended the construction of seventy-five water control projects, and is at the present time president of the Morgan Engineering company as well as a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

His interest in definite educational projects became aroused through his very intimate association with the establishment and development in Dayton of the Moraine Park school, whose director, Dr. Slutz, has been heard with interest several times in this community. It was this phase of his work which brought him to the attention of the trustees of Antioch college and influenced them to offer him the presidency.

The man who is to speak on "What Should College Do for Life" is, therefore, no mere idealistic theorist. He is a practical engineer, a successful business man, and also an educator of purpose and achievement. No intelligent person who seeks to be wellinformed can afford to miss this lecture. It will be given in the auditorium of the Deerfield-Shields high school on Thursday evening, Jan. 5, under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher association of the high school.
