

SURVEY UNDER WAY FOR ROAD EXTENSION

Securing Data for Possible Condemnation Proceedings Is Reported

Survey is under way in connection with the plan of the city administration to consider condemnation proceedings against property affected in the proposed extension of Sheridan road south from Central to Laurel avenue and then curving south to the west of the Library building to connect with St. Johns avenue. The preliminary work is being carried on and the matter probably will come before the board of local improvements for actual initiation of the project later in the winter.

Chief among the actors who will take part in "Number 17" are J. Williams Macy and Samuel S. Otis, two troupers who have already won a measure of distinction in local production. Mr. Otis, in the role of a cockney sailor, will have a broad opportunity to indulge his irresistible humor in a unique characterization. His fellow conspirator, an unknown companion met in a London fog, and who proves to be an important factor as the plot unrolls, is Mr. Gilbert Fordyce. This is the part to be taken by Mr. Macy.

N. S. THEATER GUILD TO PRESENT NUMBER 17

The cast for "Number 17," a mystery play that is to be the next offering of the North Shore Theater Guild in its tour of the northern suburbs, has been announced. It contains many names already familiar to Guild audiences, and is a group representing nearly every shore town from Evanston to Lake Forest.

Mary A. Harding, of Winnetka, will make her first appearance with the Guild as Nora, a victim of circumstances, whose efforts to turn from a life of crime are met with countless complications. The role of "Henry," a mysterious character who might turn out to be either good or evil, will be taken by George W. Bartlett. These two players are members of the Community Drama club of Winnetka, and have often been seen in Drama club productions. Other parts in "Number 17" will

be portrayed by J. Lincoln Gibson, Eugene E. Macy, Miss G. Coma, Hawley Mertz and Joe Shippen. All these players have had extensive experience in amateur dramatic work, either in previous plays of the North Shore Theater Guild or elsewhere.

With the return of David Owen, the director, from Boston, rehearsals of "Number 17" will begin in earnest. This play will require more than the usual amount of drilling on account of the complicated nature of the stage effects it calls for. It is doubtful if amateurs ever before attempted a play that requires such a thorough mystery of detail as this English melodrama. It was for this reason that Mr. Owen went to Boston to observe the play in progress there and perfect his plans to produce it.

According to present plans, "Number 17" is to begin its itinerary on about January 17, at Lake Forest. It has never been produced in a Chicago or a New York playhouse. It will be given in Highland Park January 18.

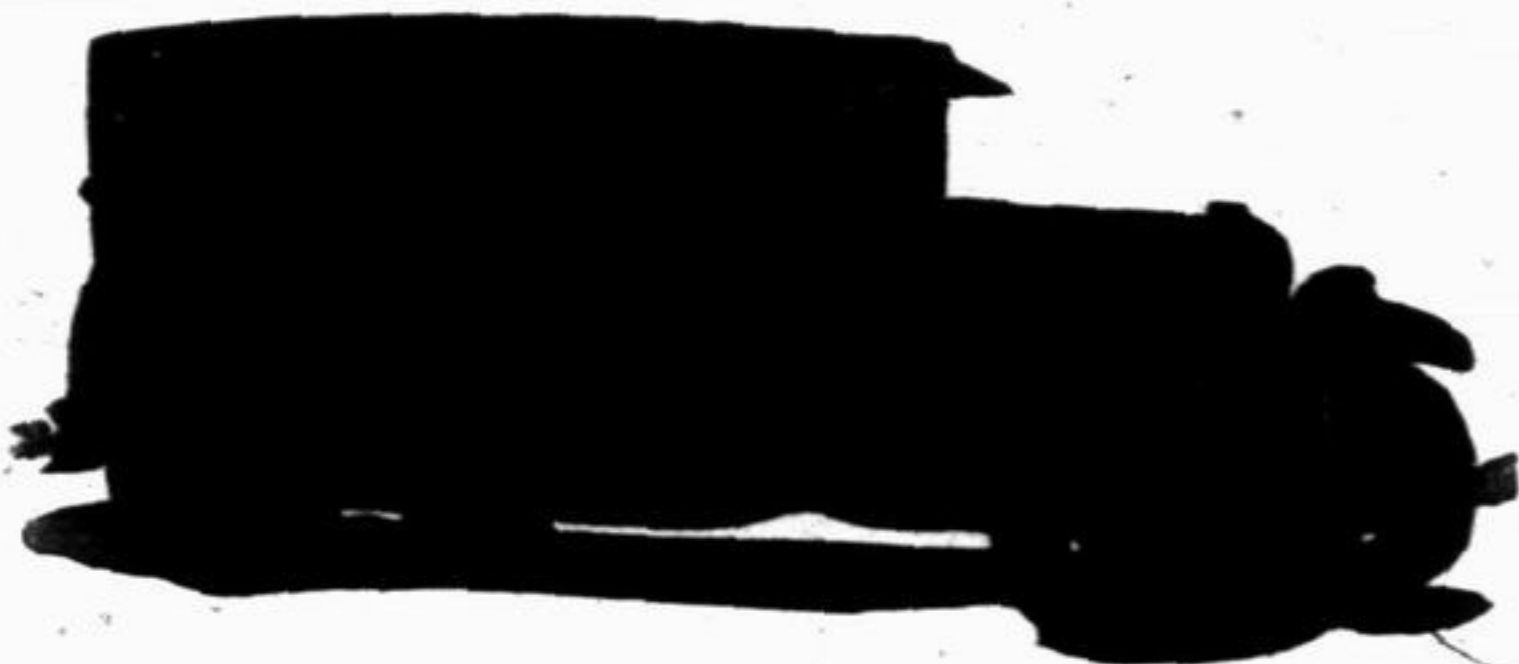
