When we think of any dish with Mr. and Mrs. G. See of Rogers the name Creole, we expect to find comething that is very well seasoned and quite satisfying in flavor.

Creole macaroni, the recipe for which I am going to give you, is a dish that is very well liked and may be used for the main dish for a meal or as a side dish to serve with

Creole Macaroni

- 1 cup maraconi cooked in 2 quarts boiling water with
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt. When done, drain and rinse with
- cold water. 3 tablespoons butter
- ¼ cup green pepper cut fine
- 2 tablespoons onion cut fine 4 tablespoons flour
- ½ teaspoons salt 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard 2 cups strained tomato
- 3 tab. American cheese cut fine. Melt butter in double boiler, add green pepper and onion. Mix flour, salt paprika and mustard and add. Pour into this gradually the strained tomato and cook until it thickens

slightly. Add cheese and stir until Place alternate layers of macaroni and sauce in greased baking dish, having sauce on top. Cover with buttered crumbs, prepared by melting 2 tablespoons butter and stirring into it % cup fine bread crumbs. Bake

1/2 hour at 450. This macaroni may be baked at a lower temperature if you prefer or if you are using a lower temperature for other foods and wish to bake it at the same time. In that case it will require longer baking.
