MORE MEN IN NORMAL SCHOOLS IN PENNSY.

Ninety per cent of the 3,807 students graduated this year from the 14 state and 2 city normal schools of Pennsylvania prepared to teach in elementary schools. The remainder specialized in art, music, commercial education, health education, and home economics. The 1925-26 graduates exceeded graduates of all previous years both in total numbers and in the number of men graduates. All had four years of high school training or equivalent before entering normal school.

CITIES MAINTAIN VARIETY OF SCHOOLS

Range From Kindergarten to College Courses; Schools For Unfortunates

Approximately one person in every five living in continental United States, in cities of 10,000 or more population, attends a public school, according to figures recently compiled by the Bureau of Education, Interior Department, published in Bulletin, 1925, No. 41, Statistics of city school systems, 1923-24. The exact percentage of school enrollment during that year was 19.4 per cent of population, based on the 1920 census.

In 773 cities of 10,000 or more population public day schools were in operation for an average of 185 days during the school year, and were attended by 8,742,969 pupils, of whom 81.4 per cent were in average daily attendance. Pupils ranged from kindergarten to collegiate grade, and were enrolled in day schools, including vocational schools, and schools for the deaf, blind, and other special classes; but these figures do not include pupils in continuation, night, and summer schools. An average of 36.3 pupils were enrolled per teacher employed. Operation of these schools necessitated employment of 256,020 principals, superintendents, and instructors, and the maintenance of 14,922 buildings, at a total expenditure of \$907,807,163, exclusive of payments on principal of school debts.

Public schools in towns and villages of 2,500 to 10,000 population were maintained at a total expenditure for the year of \$195,669,708, exclusive of night and summer schools. These schools employed a teaching force of 80,271 persons and enrolled 2,491,197 pupils.

Altogether, during the school year 1923-24, for the instruction of 12,693,495 pupils, 2,881 city school systems in continental United States maintained day schools, night schools, summer and continuation schools, under a teaching force of 373,649 persons, at a grand total expenditure for the school year of \$1,118,926,543. This amount does not include payments made during the year toward liquidation of school debts.

REASONS WHY WOMEN LIKE READY-TO-WEAR

Conclusions of Interest Are Reached in Survey by Economics Body

Conclusions of interest to the manufacturers of ready-to-wear garments and those concerned with the sale of textiles by the yard and of sewing materials may be drawn from the reports received from nearly 2,000 women in the course of a recent survey of present trends in home sewing, carried on by the Bureau of Home Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture. This survey was planned to obtain more definite information as to what proportion of women are continuing to sew at home and what they make, what difficulties they encounter in connection with the family clothing, and why they buy ready-to-wears.

While it might be thought that the logical reason for a woman's buying ready-made garments was that she did not know how to sew, this factor seems to have the least influence of any on the purchase of ready-to-wears. Except in the lowest income group, this reason was not often given. Almost 70 per cent of those answering the question believed that they obtained better style and design in the ready-to-wear garment than they could produce themselves, and still more, 72 per cent, bought ready-to-wears to save time and energy. A great many women seem unable to visualize the finished garment from a piece of material and a pattern. These buy ready-made because they can see how the garment looks.

Fitting oneself is frequently considered difficult. Some women are more timid about working with silk and wool than with cotton, because a mistake is more costly, so they make their cotton house dresses but buy their afternoon and street frocks of silk or wool ready-made. The professional tailoring and pressing of ready-to-wears is an important element in their attraction, for the woman sewing at home often thinks she lacks just the touch needed for a tailored finish. In small communities the lack of variety in yard goods and trimmings accounts for the purchase of many ready-to-wears. In some instances women who do not sew but who have always employed a seamstress report that good dressmakers can not be found and so they have turned to the ready-to-wears instead.

As the size of the community increases and also as the income increases, a larger percentage buy ready-to-wears because of better style and design and also to save time and energy. Appearance becomes relatively more important in larger communities, and as outside interests and activities increase, there is less opportunity for sewing.
