APDITORIUM FRONT NEARS COMPLETION

Soon Finished, Belief of Principal

"Work on the front extension of Elm Place school auditorium is progressing favorably," says Jesse L. Smith, principal of the school. "The carpentry work is nearly completed, the floors are laid, and the walls are reatly for plastering.

"Our great difficulty in building this extension was in getting a small entrance room, but one which would be in place with the high outer walls of the auditorium. This was accomplished by stepping the masonry up and back, giving the effect of height, yet coinciding with the rest of the architecture."

Mr. Smith hopes to have the auditorium completed by Washington's birthday, and from all indications, he says, it will be ready by then.
