



**SCOUTS CELEBRATE WEEK OF FEB. 5TH**

Highland Park Boy Scouts will mark the celebration of Scout Anniversary week, February 5 to 12, with their annual Father and Son banquet, which will be held at the Deerfield-Shields high school dining room at 8:30 o'clock on the evening of Monday, Feb. 6. A Court of Honor will be held in connection with the affair. This banquet is not to be confused with the annual high school Fathers and Sons dinner, which is wholly a school affair and is scheduled for about February 22.

All local troop members are being urged to attend the scout event, February 6, and to bring their fathers, and it is expected that at least 800 fathers and sons will be present. An adequate program is being prepared and the affair promises to be an important event on scout circles and of notable interest to parents as well.

**Annual Celebration**  
This banquet is a feature of the annual observance of Scout week which is being planned here in connection with the nationwide celebration of Scouting's eighteenth birthday. Feb. 8 is the eighteenth anniversary of the incorporation of the Boy Scouts of America from which scouting has progressed until the movement now has 800,000 boys and leaders.

The organization seeks to build character in boys and to train them for the duties of citizenship. The Boy Scout movement has left its impression upon 3,500,000 since 1910. On the night of February 8, hundreds of thousands of boys, following the an-

nual scouting custom, will rededicate themselves anew to the ideals and objectives of the scout movement as expressed in the Scout Oath and Law to which they will again pledge themselves thus:

**Scout Oath**

- "On my honor I will do my best—  
1. To do my duty to God and my country, and to obey the Scout law.  
2. To help other people at all times.  
3. To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight.

There will be scout programs on every day of the week, expressive of the Boy Scouts life and activities, closing with church service on Sunday, Feb. 12.

**World Movement**

The Boy Scouts of America is part of a great movement growing around the world. More than fifty nations have Boy Scout organizations affiliated through an international brotherhood with the Boy Scouts of America, hence scouting is regarded as a great force for world peace.
