URGES CONTINUANCE

STILL NECESSITY

Federal Education Commission-Declares Plenty of Room for Work in This Line

America still needs to make war on illiteracy, according to John J. Tigert, United States Committion on Education who declares in an article on the subject in the current issue of the National Republic that there is still room for patriotic volunteer service in combatting this natural enemy of free inetitutions.

"We have two pictures of our illiteracy-absolute illiteracy as revealed by the census each ten years, and illiteracy as revealed by the army test in 1917," says Mr. Tigert. "These two pictures attract attention by the contrast they present.

Considered Literate "If a man can write his name in any language he is considered as literate in the census returns. The efficials of the army tried to find out the men in the draft who were really able to read and write, If an order in plain English were handed to man could he read it understandingly? Could he write a simple letter so that it could be understood? More than one-fourth of the 1,700,000 men examined could not pass these simple tests; 25.3 per cent of these men had to be classed as illiterates so far as military duties were concerned. These men were between twenty and thirtyfour yars of age. The census return show that illiteracy is greater in old groups and tht it is more common among females than males. It is probably true that one in four of our population ten years of age and over cannot read understandingly or convey a message by writing.

From 1920 Census "From the 1920 census we find that there were 4,931,905 people over ten years of age in the United States who could not sign their names in any language; 3,084,733 of these illiterates were native-born and 1,242,572 of the number were native-born whites.

"The census returns each decade show that the relative number of people who cannot sign their names is growing smaller but that the actual number of individuals classed as illiterate is only slightly smaller than it was in 1870. In that year the Bureau of Census reported 5,658,144 illiterates. Our population has inof illiteracy has decreased from twen-1920.

> Report of Fire Marshal Shows Reduction of Five Millions in 1927

Better observance of fire protection laws of the state of Illinois during 1927 resulted in a reduction of losses during the year totaling approximately \$5,000,000, according to records of State Fire Marshal S. L. Legreid.

Losses for the first eleven months of the year totalled \$19,535,610, compared to a loss for 1926 totalling \$25,-968,006. For 1925 the loss from the same source was \$28,517,780, with that of 1924 given as \$24,187,649.-

"We are gratified, of course, at the showing," said State Fire Marshal Legreid, "but we do not presume too much on this record for the year. am working at this time on plans to co-ordinate the facilities of the department to the fullest possible ex-

"We expect to push with all of the vigor possible both the inspection and investigation work. Inspectors will be kept constantly on the trail of hazards and investigators will keep after the incendiaries. I am going to try to make Illinois an unhealthy place for those who set fires.

"Our campaign to safeguard school houses will be pushed Many counties have been covered and we have made plans to cover the balance as quickly as possible. Every child is entitled to attend school in a safe building and our aim is to see that he gets at least reasonable safety."
