Dr. Harold O. Rugg, a professor in the School of Education of Columbia university, has attempted this difficult task of looking into the future and trying to predict what problems the next generation will face. He has collected the judgments of competent students of social and economic problems regarding what the future is likely to bring forth. Upon the basis of these opinions and the analysis of the great social and economic problems that have persisted over several generations, he has built a new course of study for the seventh, eighth, and ninth grades which he calls "social science."

Dr. Rugg is well known as one of the most brilliant of the younger American educators. He is a brilliant, enlightening and entertaining speaker.
