A new world's record for y electric railway operation was established here during the week before Christmas when for three days the Chicago Surface Lines had every one of its 3,639 passenger cars in operation during the heavy peak loads. No other large street car system ever

The second step in the most comprehensive street paving project in the history of Glencoe, was taken at the meeting of the Village board last week in the form of an approval of a tentative scheme of the street paying program submitted by Street Commissioner Aaron B. Moe, with a request for a president's estimate of
