CHICAGO SURFACE LINES BREAK TRAFFIC RECORDS

A new world's record in electric railway operation was established here during the week before Christmas when for three days the Chicago Surface Lines had every one of its 3,639 passenger cars in operation during the heavy peak loads. No other large street car system ever has equalled this record, it is stated. During the six days preceding Christmas the Surface Lines carried 29,576,412 passengers, a total of more than 2,500,000 over the corresponding period in 1926.

GLENCOE PLANNING EXTENSIVE PAVING

Program for 32-foot Roadway on Number of Streets Is Presented

The second step in the most comprehensive street paving project in the history of Glencoe, was taken at the meeting of the Village board last week in the form of an approval of a tentative scheme of the street paving program submitted by Street Commissioner Aaron B. Moe, with a request for a president's estimate of the cost. This matter was referred to the Commissioner several months ago for a comprehensive study and report, President W. D. Gerber and the entire board appreciating the urgent need of the broad plan of improvements which have been recommended and also that it is a work which should be undertaken under one general scheme, instead of by piece meal. The recommendation is for pavement 32 feet wide on a number of streets. It is proposed to divide the work up in the most advantageous manner, Village Attorney Alexander H. Marshall suggesting that two, and perhaps three, proceedings will be required.
