> AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION OF THE INSTALLATION, ALTERATION AND USE OF ELECTRI-CAL EQUIPMENT, AND FOR THE IN-SPECTION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUN-CIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS: Section 1. The term "electrical equip-ment" as used in this ordinance, means conductors and equipment installed for the uti-lization of electricity supplied for light, heat or power, but does not include radio apparatus or equipment for wireless reception of sounds and signals, and does not include apparatus, conductors and other equipment installed for or by public ultilities, including common carriers, which are under the jurisdiction of the Illinois Commerce Commission, for use in their operation as public utilities. Section 2. There is hereby established an electrical inspection department for the regulation of the installation, alteration and use of all electrical equipment, as herein provided. Such electrical inspection department shall be a part of the Department of Public Health and Safety and shall consist of the chief electrical inspector of the city and such other employees as may from time to time be provided for by the city council. Such electrical inspection department shull be charged with the duty of enforcing the provisions of the rules and regulations relating to the installation, alteration and use

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five members, as follows: The chief electrical pector shall be a member and ex-officio four members, one shall be an electrical confour members, one shall be an electrical con-tractor, one a journeyman electrician, one a representative of an inspection bureau maintained by the fire underwriters (or, if no such representative resides in the city, then the chief of the fire department), and one a representative of an electricity supply company. Such members shall be appointed for one year by the mayor, by and with the advice and coment of the city council. The chief electrical inspector shall serve on such commission without additional compensation therefor. The other members shall such compensation as may be fixed by the city council (or shall serve without compen-

Section 4. There is hereby created the son chosen to fill the office of chief electrical inspector shall be a competent electrician of good moral character, who shall Yesterday afternoon Mrs. George Vote in Favor of Plan to Finance construction, shall be well versed in approved methods of electrical construction for safety to life and property, the statutes of State of Illinois relating to electrical work, the rules and regulations issued by the Fire Marshal of Illinois under authority of the statutes, the National Electrical Code, and other installation and safety rules and standards approved by the American Engineering Standards Committee.

Section 5. Said chief electrical inspector shall be appointed for one year by the mayor, by and with the advice and consent of the city council. He shall serve without salary or at such salary as may be provided by ordinance from time to time. Before enter-

ties hereunder, to engage in the business of the installation, alteration, maintenance or the installation, alteration, maintenance or sale of electric wiring, electric devices or electric material, either directly or indirectly, and he shall have no financial interest in this city at any time while holding the office of chief electrical inspector. Any giolation of the provisions of this section by said chief electrical inspector shall be sufficient cause for his removal from office but he may be for his removal from office, but he may removed for other causes as provided

Section 6. Such electrical commission shall recommend safe and practical standards and specifications for the installation, alteration and use of electrical equipment designed to meet the necessities and conditions that prevail in this city, shall recommend reasonable rules and regulations governing the issuance of permits by the electrical inspection de partment, and shall recommend reasonable fees to be paid for the inspection of such inspection department of all electrical equipment installed or altered within this city Provided, that such standards and specifications, such rules and regulations, and such fees shall not-become effective until adopted by ordinance by the city council. All such fees shall be paid to the city treasurer.

Section 8. Said chief electrical in shall have the right during reasonable hours to enter any building in the discharge of his official duties, or for the purpose of making any inspection or test of the installation or alteration of electrical equipment contained therein, and shall have the authority to come the turning off of all electrical cur-

rents and to cut or disconnect in cases of emergency any wire where such electrical currents are dangerous to life or property or may interfere with the work of the fire department. Section 9. Upon the completion of the installation or alteration of electrical equipment in any building, it shall be the duty of the person, firm or corporation installing or altering the same to notify the chief trical inspector, who shall inspect the work within twenty-four hours after such notice a given; and if such electrical equ is found to be fully in compliance with this ordinance and does not constitute a hazard to life and property, he shall issue to such person, firm or corporation, for delivery to the owner, a certificate of inspection authorising connection to the electrical service and the turning on of the current, All wires


