The annual meeting of the Highland Park Young Women's Christian Association will be held tonight at six-thirty o'clock at the association headquarters, 374 Laurel avenue. A World Fellowship program will be presented by the various clubs as announced previously. The meeting will open with an invocation by the Rev. K. A. Roth. A Girl Reserve chorus will sing "In True Fellowship our hearts and hands we bring," following the dinner. This will be followed by a prayer in unison. A short business meeting will then be held at which the important business will be a discussion of the new membership basis, and the report of the election of members of the board of directors. Miss Helen T. McQuillen, general secretary will give greetings. The program which will then be presented may be found in the following little poem which appears on the program:

"I thought that little foreign girls

Other features on the program include and English Folk Dance by the girl reserve "Cubs," a tableau presentation of the Y. W. C. A. in England by members of the Mothers' club, in South America by the B. Y's club, in Japan by the Friendship club. The program will be ended by the singing of "Follow the Glem" by all.

The Y. W. C. A. will open a roller skating rink on Saturday afternoon from three to five o'clock in their basement play room. All grade school girls are cordially invited to come. If girls bring their own skates only ten cents admission will be charged. If skates are rented from the Y. W. C. A. an additional ten cents will be charged.

#### Pearl Theater Offers Unusual Programs of Pictures; Alcyon Continues Good Bills

S. L. Greenberg, formerly assistant to Mr. Bruce Godshaw at the Alcyon theater, has been appointed by Mr. Louis Laemmle and Directing Manager Godshaw as manager of the Pearl Theatre which opens for the season on Saturday evening, Feb. 4. Manager Greenberg announces an improved 100% ventilating and heating system and a program of bigger and more expensive photoplays. His gratitude to Mr. Godshaw for his advancement was such that he immediately instituted a program of pictures which will afford the Alcyon some real competition. The Pearl opens on Saturday, Feb. 4, with Buck Jones in "The Branded Sombros" and a bill of high class vaudeville. 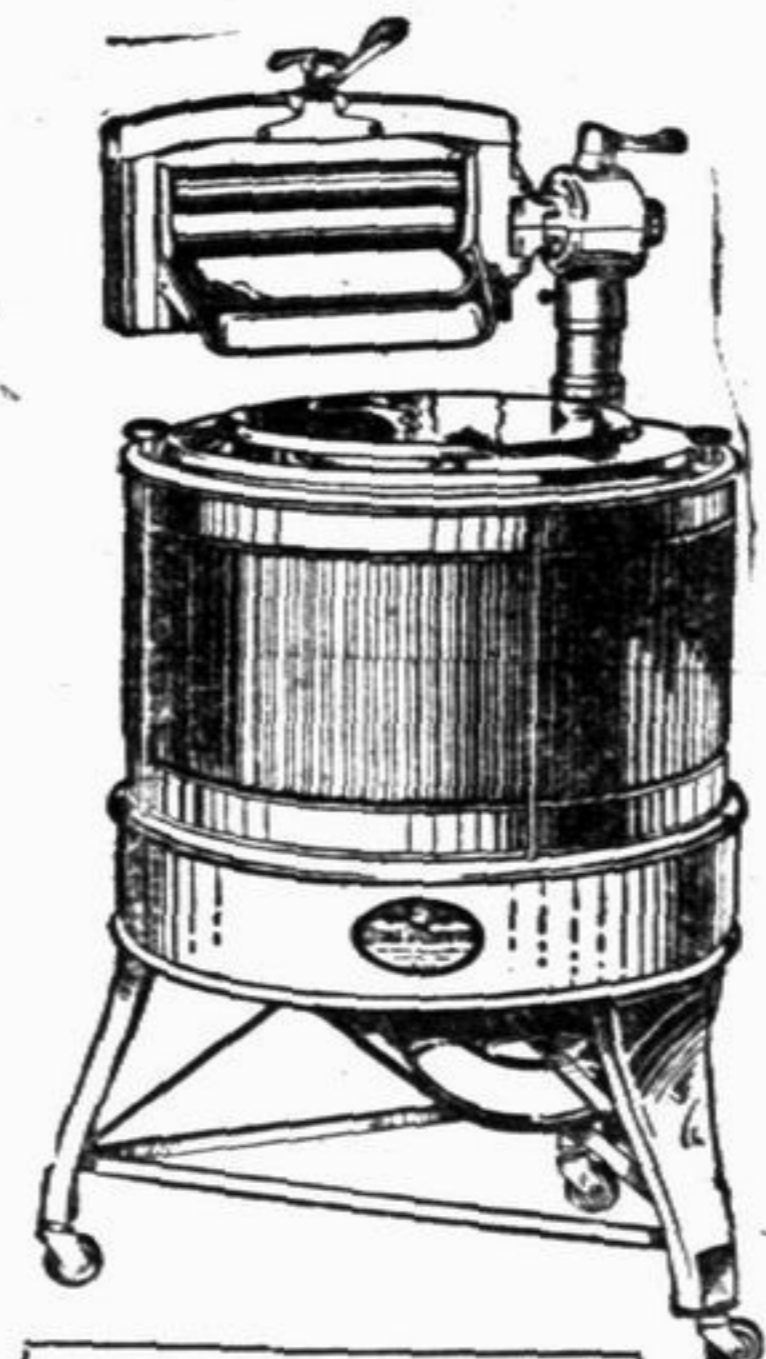
