AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PARK BONDS OF THE HIGHLAND PARK BAST PARK DIS-TRICT IN THE SUM OF TWO HUN-DRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$250,000.00), AND PROVIDING FOR WHEREAS, The Highland Park East Park District is a duly organised Park District under the laws of the State of Illinois, and is charged with the duty of sequiring and maintaining a public park or parks in said maintaining a public park or parks in said district; and
WHEREAS, it is necessary for the purpose of providing funds for the payment of land condemned, or to be condemned, or purchased, for parks or bullevards, or both, for the building, maintaining, protecting and improving of the same, and for the payment of expenses incident thereto, that there be burrowed two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) and that bonds be issued therefor;
