Miss Elizabeth Marbury, a playwright of New York City, and also the Democratic national committee-woman of the State of New York, has now formally and somewhat humorously confessed that she was the female Cockrobin who with bow and arrow shot the Democratic national convention to Houston. With considerable frankness, she admits that when in Washington assembled with her associate committee members, she was oppressed and distressed by the seriousness with which they were all taking themselves, their party and their issues.

Miss Marbury is a keen observer, and it is easy to see how that was a very natural conclusion for her to reach. She decided, accordingly, to lighten up the proceedings, and, therefore, after discovering the Detroit committee could provide a hall, but was doubtful of its ability to present the delegates with free Fords as gifts, and after San Francisco had decided that it would give \$250,000 but intended to retain its title to the Golden Gate, she announced to Norman Mack, her New York associate, that she was going to vote for Houston.

She willingly admits now that she believed that her original declaration in favor of the Gulf State city brought about its selection. On the whole, it is impossible to disagree very seriously with Miss Marbury. Where the Democrats meet, is really of no special importance, anyway, and once again, apparently, a woman's intuition has reduced the problem to its proper level.

COMPROMISE EXPECTED ON FARM LEGISLATION

Those who have attended the hearings on farm relief which have just been re-opened at the capitol report that the willingness to compromise is more pronouncedly evident than ever before. Already, certain of the supporters of the McNary-Haugen bill have intimated that they are willing to remake the procedure originally suggested for the selection of the farm governing board as provided in the bill.

There has also developed a willingness to again discuss the merits or demerits of the equalization fee, which has always been the most controversial part of the McNary-Haugen measure. Williams of Illinois and Ketcham of Michigan, members of the agricultural committee who have sustained it in the past, have already announced that they would not again vote for a bill that contained that provision. Chairman Haugen still insists that he will not give up the fight

—that the farmers demand this fee, or nothing; but, for all of that there are signs that many members are anxious to frame some sort of a measure which will have the President's approval.
