4. Decorative arrangements of dormant or forced writings from shrubs, tree etc., in bud and leaf, with flowers barred.

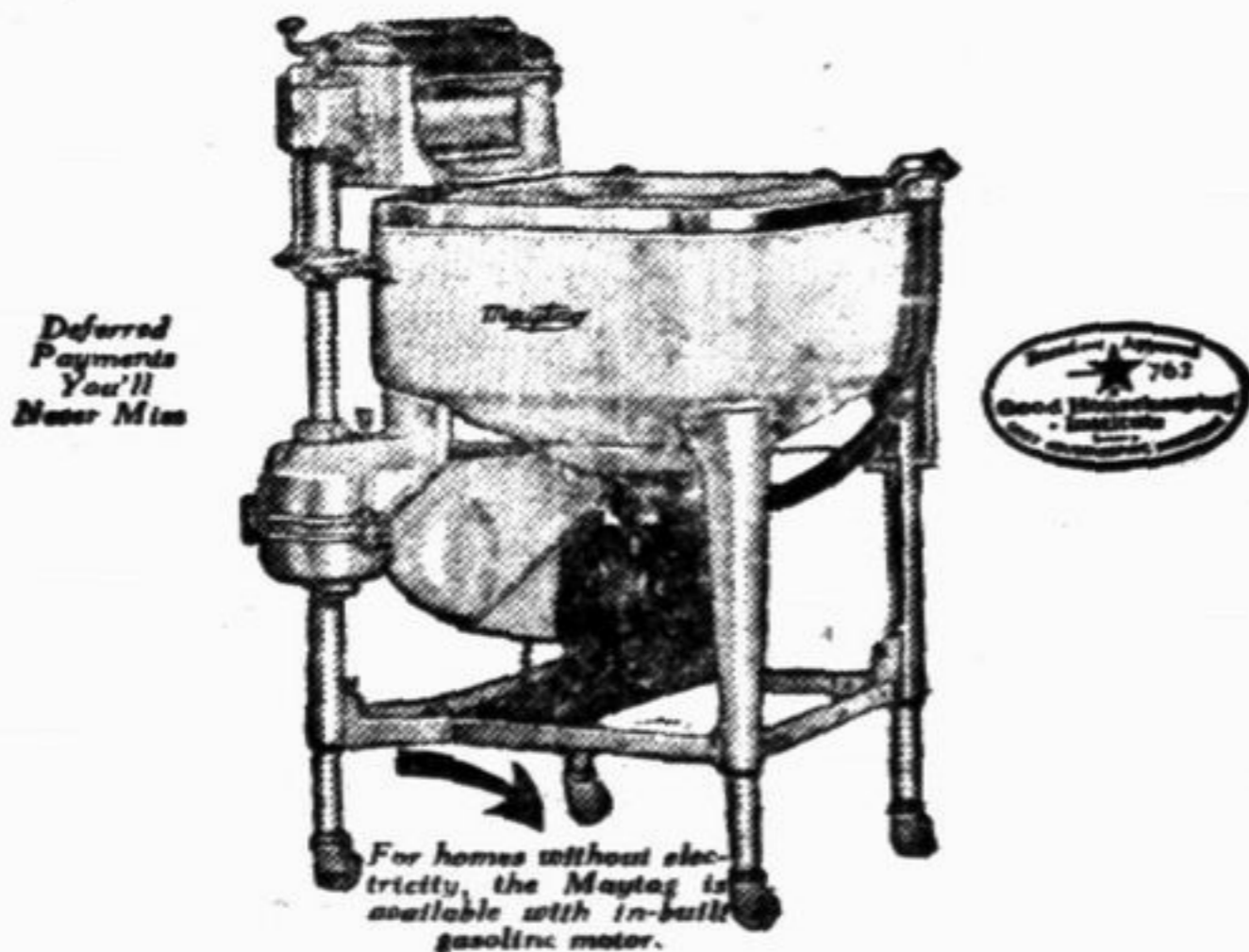
