MASS MEETINGS ON BOND ISSUE PLAN

(Continued from page 1) 8 o'clock, and the Commission is inviting all interested to attend, feeling that property owners will be interested in learning as much as possible about the proposed fire department substation in the southern part of the city, new library and city hall sites, municipal yards, bridge improvements etc., which are to be financed by the issue of bonds, if these are approved by the voters at the election of March 10.

Elm Place Meeting Similar effort is urged to secure a large attendance at the second mass meeting to be held at Elm Place on March 6, Mayor Lewis also will be the principal speaker at this meeting, and all property owners and others interested should attend, so as to get the facts before attempting to vote on the bond issue propositions.

As previously explained the bond issue propositions include \$100,000 for corporate purposes to pay off public benefits now assessed against the city for public improvements, which includes the city's share under special assessment proceedings.

The \$150,000 in street widening bonds will be used to pay for the city's portion of special assessment which are either in court or contemplated. The \$85,000 bridge bonds are to finance the building of a new bridge on Dean avenue, a new foot bridge on Cary avenue and for necessary repairs on practically all other bridges in the city, except the North Sheridan road bridges, which the state has promised to construct.

Municipal Yard The Municipal Yard bonds for \$25,000 are for the purchase of a site and buildings for storage of material used by the city at a point convenient to railway transportation. The \$25,000 fire station bonds are to purchase a site and construct a fire station to cover the southern part of the city. The \$55,000 city hall bonds are to purchase a site and pay a portion of the cost of erecting a new city hall, with a view of selling the present site and building and applying the proceeds also to the new one. The \$100,000 library site bonds are to be used for purchase of a new site for the public library.

Other Improvements Urgent And while the city administration and the people of the city generally are interested in these improvement propositions, the Press feels that it is an opportune time to suggest that South Green Bay road also is urgent. The new McCormick boulevard which is being planned in Cook county will come up through Glencoe at a width of at least 40 feet, it is understood and will connect with Green Bay Rd., just south of our city limits.

This means that a bottle neck will be formed at the very borders of Highland Park and traffic in Green Bay Road in this city north from the county line will be greatly congested and made extremely dangerous. The Press does not believe that property owners on South Green Bay Road will be opposed to the widening of this thoroughfare if they are in possession of all the facts in the matter and realize how important it is not only to the progress of the city but to the welfare of those who live on this street themselves.

Large cities like Chicago spending millions of dollars in widening their streets because they consider a wide street much more safe than a narrow one. With the new McCormick boulevard ending at our very door it is absolutely necessary that Green Bay road be widened at once. It is the only straight through street in Highland Park. It runs from one end of our city to the other without a turn or bend. Sheridan road cannot possible take care of the heavy summer traffic.

We trust the city officials will realize the importance of widening this street and start the "ball rolling." When we ask city officials why something isn't done to widen South Green Bay, we are told that the people living on that street don't want it widened. We can hardly believe this, because it is recognized everywhere nowadays that wide through streets are not only necessary to the welfare of the city but to the safety of its citizens as well. We are sure that when the people of that street know the facts they will be unanimously in favor of widening.

Another matter which, it is believed, should have immediate attention is the widening of the Northwestern railroad viaduct at Bloom street. It is understood that the city officials are taking up this matter and that effort will be made to arrive at a satisfactory conclusion, but this viaduct should be widened, as a large number of vehicles pass through it from Green Bay Road and traffic is likely to increase rather than diminish.

Similarly the viaduct on Sheridan place should be widened. This is a very narrow viaduct and conditions there, because of the junction of two streets make it especially dangerous for traffic passing through. This matter also should have early attention, it is believed.

A question that is being asked about town is: "Where is the \$150,000 street widening money to be spent?" That is a question that should be answered before election. Some of this we understand will be spent on North Green Bay road. What's going to be done with the rest?
