 His wife survives him, as do his four children Mable R. Ehle, Elsie R. Phelps, Percy A. Robbins, all of Highland Park, and Ralph W. Robbins of Timmins, Ontario, Canada.

Mr. Robbins would have been 87 years old on his next birthday, and until a year ago he was able to go into Chicago to transact such business as was required. He was alert mentally until the last, but his physical strength had been waning for several months, and the end was not unexpected. As was his habit, he had been out for a stroll only two days before he passed away.

He was the last of a family of thirteen children born to Isaac and Ruth Robbins of Watertown, Mass., several of his brothers and sisters having lived to beyond 80 years of age.

Widely Esteemed
 Mr. Robbins was a man of marked talents and nobility of character and highly regarded by his associates during his long years of business activity. He had a host of warm friends in Highland Park and Chicago, whose sorrow at his death is sincere, and the family have the deep sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

The funeral was held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the family residence, the Christian Science service being used, and burial was in Rosehill cemetery.
