frequently included farm lands. In the meantime the Farm bloc bill was passed under agreement that the compromise bill would be passed. When the compromise bill was called the Farm bloc seeing that only twenty-nine senators were present silently voted "No" and thus defeated the compromise. The legislature adjourned. Since die, two days later not giving time to again consider the compromise bill.

Senator Swift gave notice that the fight could have been won with fair play and if he was again a senator he would join with the "down State" communities and put it over. As the matter now stands the bonding limit of the entire State until July 1, 1928 is five per cent if the people at an election called for the purpose vote that they want to create bonded debts to this extent. After July 1, 1928 the limit is two and one-half per cent except for Chicago and Cook county, which will retain the five per cent rate.

SUBJECT FOR FEB. 27**

**Child Guidance Class Meets at
Elm Place School Next
Monday Afternoon**

The child guidance class of the Elm Place P.T.A. will meet Monday afternoon, Feb. 27, at 3:15 in room 3 of the kindergarten building. Refreshments will be served at the beginning of the meeting.

At the last meeting the topic was "Self Reliance." On Monday the practical problem of developing self reliance with regard to money will be discussed informally. What is your experience in training children to appreciate the value of money? Should children be paid for doing errands? Should they be given allowances? How much money should they handle? What supervision of the saving and spending plans of the children should be given?

A second topic will be the so-called "Inferiorty Complex," a term often met and seldom explained. It seems that a child is often made miserable by some unnecessary and trivial trouble which he distorts into something out of proportion to its real importance. This produces a state of mind where normal self-confidence is impossible. Such brooding is unhealthy even if it leads to nothing more, and should be prevented. But in many cases children develop conduct-habits which puzzle parents and teachers and become "problem children." Lying, stealing, bullying, laziness, and unruliness are often nothing more than an unfortunate by-product of preventable worries of little children.
