TO ASK PROTECTION AT MANY CROSSINGS

STATES ATTORNEY IN MOVE

Preparing Petition to Submit To Commerce Commission Regarding Conditions In Lake County

The petition to be presented to the Illinois Commerce Commission by State's Attorney A. V. Smith requesting this body to compel railroads operating in Lake County to furnish adequate protection at all grade crossings in the county may list 100 crossings and perhaps more, according to the Waukegan News.

County Highway Superintendent R. M. Lodbell is making a survey of grade crossings throughout the county and reported to Assistant State's Attorney Sidney H. Block that he ala ready has a list of some 30 crossings in need of better protection. Lists Crossings

Among the railroad crossings in various townships which at the present time are not adequately protected, according to Mr. Lobdell follow:

Newport township-Bussell road, Rosecrans road, two crossings in Wadsworth road, State Line road, Eddy crossing, and Town Line road. Antioch township-Loon lake road, Rosecrans road, Route 21, Russell

Benton township - Twenty-ninth street, Twenty-fifth street, Lebanon avenue, Thirty-third street, Beach road. Oak Shore road, Twentyseventh street, Eighteenth street, Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Twenty-seventh street, Thirty-first street, and Thirty-second street.

State's Attorney Smith announced several days ago that better protection would be demanded in North Chicago for the Twenty-second street crossing of the North Western and North Shore roads and at the crossings of the St. Paul and E. J. & E., at Roundout.

Brought Before Board The matter of better protection a railroad grade crossings in Lake county was brought to the attention of the board of supervisors at the December meeting by Supervisor Dave Van Petten of Newport town ship. The board at his request went on record in favor of making demands for better protection at grade crossings and referred the matter to State's Attorney Smith. The prosecutor decided the best way to get satisfaction would be to petition the Illinois Commerce Commission.

It is necessary to have the petition supported by a detailed report of the county highway superintendent and as soon as Mr. Lobdell completes his report, State's Attorney Smith will file the petition with the Illinois Commerce Commission.

TOWNSHIP TICKETS MAY RETAIN TITLES

Legislature Passes Amendment Permitting Them to Keep Old Names

The worry brought to various township political organizations through the county, which had been barred from filing their candidates under their party appellations, came to an end last week through passage of an amendment by the assembly that permitted organizations to keep their identity permanently.

The senate had introduced the bill and the house passed it shortly after. It came as an amendment to the ballot act that provided that no party could enter candidates intownship elections if it had received 2 per cent or more of the vote cast at the preceding election.

In that was it ruled out the most popular parties.

The trio were on 12 hours leave from the fort and were hastening to this city to visit a brother of Roseman, Graborzyk said.

Derdowski was driving. As they passed through Cudahy he attempted to drive around another car which made a shap left turn the survivor said. To avoid a collision Derdowski then turned to the right, the machine crashing into a tree.

TO BUILD ROUTE 173 THIS SUMMER IS PLAN

Assurance from Governor's Office is Received; Rightof-Way Matters

Assurance that Route 173, Zion to Rockford, will be under construction this summer, were received last week from the office of Gov. Len Small. according to the Waukegan Sun.

The governor stated that the work of surveying the route between Caledonia and Harvard had been completed and that the work yet to be done lay in Lake county.

The road, in all probabilities, will swing west from a point at or near Zion and parallel the Illinois-Wisconsin line so as to serve Russell and Antioch, McHenry and Boone counties. This highway will then connect with the concrete strip between Beloit and Rockford.

Work of securing right-of-ways through Lake county is not under way as yet. Decision has not been reached, it is understood, as to the exact routing. A meeting was held several weeks ago at Zion at which time the residents of the district made their suggestions to the state highway department. The governor at that time stated that everything possible would be done to get the paving underway this summer.

On route 176, from Lake Bluff to Dubuque, Ia., there is some dissention in MeHenry county. Both Woodstock and Crystal Lake are bidding for it. Under the law 176 is to be built under the \$100,000,000 road bond issue from Mundelein, through Ivanhoe to Wauconda and over Button's bridge into McHenry county.

COUNTY IN ACCIDENT

Suit for \$25,000 damages was filed last week in the ciruit court agains! F. C. Feutz, paving contractor, and Lake county by James McGillan, Chieago, who blames the county and the contractor for an accident which occurred Oct. 1, 1927, on Antioch road between Zion and Antioch. Attorney Joseph Bishop of Zion filed the bill.

McGillan, according to the bill, was driving on the Antioch road, which was then in the state of paving when he came to the end of the concrete. He was unable to halt in time to pre-

His car, he sets forth, was badly damaged and he suffered injuries to himself that have cost him \$5,000 so far, he claims.

The county, the bill recites, was responsible for marking the road so as to show the end of the concrete. Its alleged failure to do this constituted gross negligence, McGillan claims.

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
