BAD FIRE DAMAGES WAUKEGAN Y. W. C. A.

Blaze Sunday Morning Ruins Old Building Occupied by the Organization

Fire starting Sunday morning from an undetermined cause in a room occupied by Miss Catherine Miller, gutted the top floor, annex and part of the second floor of the building occupied by the Y.W.C.A., on South Genesee street, Waukegan, causing an estimated damage of \$10,000.

The fire was discovered by Miss Miller, on her return after a few minutes absence and an alarm was telephoned the fire department. On the arrival of Chief Sars O'Farrel and the fire apparatus, the chief saw that the blaze was a dangerous one and called for additional help. The North Chicago firemen rendered valuable assistance to the two Waukegan companies.

A high northwest wind made the work of the department difficult, and within a few minutes after its arrival the northwest corner of the roof was ablaze.

The fire worked its way into the annex, which faces the east, burning through the roof and into the floor below. It was only after a determined fight on the part of the department that the building was saved from total destruction.

CHICAGO LEADS U. S. CITIES IN BUILDING

Immensity of Chicago's building volume may be more fully appreciated when it is realized that in January of this year Chicago construction volume was greater than the combined total of construction nineteen principal Middle Western cities whose population is about twice that of Chicago.

Comparative figures making possible this view of the construction situation were available today through the completed national monthly building survey issued by S. W. Straus & Co.

Chicago's building volume for January was \$27,091,400. The total of the principal nineteen cities shown in the comparison amounted to \$22,839,196 or more than four million less than the month's total for this city. The nineteen cities whose building total was compared to Chicago included the following: Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Louisville, St. Louis, Des Moines, Milwaukee, Detroit, Flint, Grand Rapids, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Kansas City, Omaha, Toledo, Akron, Dayton and Youngstown.

VACATION SCHOOLS FOR CHILDREN OF TOURISTS

Plan Tried at Minnesota Resorts Appears to Be Working Out Well

A vacation school, intended primarily for children of tourists in the lake region of Minnesota, was maintained during the past summer by the board of education of Alexandria, Minn., says School Life. The school was organized to meet the demand each year by summer residents for tutors for their children. A slight charge was made for tuition, and four teachers were retained and paid for their services. Only morning sessions were held. Students were allowed to select any work they wished, but no one was allowed to register for more than two subjects. The enrollment was 53 pupils, about a third of whom were visiting children. A similar school is planned for 1928.
