MANY IN RETIREMENT SYSTEM N. Y. SCHOOLS

Over 33,000 Teachers Reported Taking Advantage of This Plan: Details

A total membership of 33,181 is reported by the New York State Teachers' Retirement System, according to recent report for the year ending July 31, 1927. The statement shows total assets of \$18,190,269.25, including a cash balance of \$1,307,-384.98. Earnings and interest collected amounted to \$739,668.92. The cost of administration, including salaries, rents, and other overhead expenses, was \$52,602.88. Retirement allowances during the year amounted to \$1,244,699.84.

The number of annuitants at the expiration of the year was 2,176, of whom 276 were men and 1,900 were women. The average age of those retired during the year was: For service, men 65, women 62 years; for disability, men 55, women 51 years of age.
