TEACHING GERMAN IN SCHOOLS OF ALSACE

Course Given Earlier in the Grades Than Formerly, It Is Reported

Instruction in German of children in elementary schools of Alsace and Lorraine is given earlier, commencing this year, if they have advanced sufficiently in the reading of French. Heretofore study of German has been delayed until the third year. It may now be taken up in the second term of the second year, according to recent announcement of the new rector of the Academy of Strassburg. The purpose is to make education bilingual in the Provinces, although French must come first in order of importance. On request of parents the catechism will be taught in German from the very beginning to assure ability of the children to read in that language from their earliest years.—School Life.
