PLAY TOURNAMENT BY DRAMA LEAGUE

The Drama League of Chicago announces their second annual Play Tournament, to be held at the Goodman theater the week of May 7, 1928. Groups of players from industries, Park houses, clubs, churches, social settlement centers, and little theaters will compete.

Sixteen groups will compete in the preliminary contest on four afternoons, giving four plays at each matinee, May 7, 8, 9, and 10. A separate contest for high school groups will compete at the Hull House Theater under the auspices of the Hull House Players, directed by Mr. Maurice Cooney.

The final contest is the play tournament will be held May 13 at 8:00 p. m., in the Goodman theater at which the four plays which have won in the preliminary groups will compete for the Drama League silver cup presented by Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, the "Better Speech Prize" awarded to the high school winner. The prizes will not be announced until the tournament opens. The contest is open to all non-professional groups who have community service as their basis of organization. All Little theater groups in and around Chicago are invited to participate either as contestants or audience. Mrs. Howard Willett is president of the Chicago Drama League and Mrs. Harold Shipley is chairman of the committee in charge of this tournament.

Interest Chiefly Is In Clothes Worn by Individuals of Prominence

A study of thirty recent radio talks on fashions shows that women are not so keenly concerned with abstractions about styles as they are with the keenly personal and concrete examples of what is being worn here, there and everywhere.

Advertisers have occasionally shown a sensing of this desire on the part of women. Newspapers respond to it when they list the gowns and costumes at a fashionable wedding or a great social event. Magazine fashion editors show signs of realizing dimly this need for objective interpretation.

But a complete fulfillment of the average woman's desire to know the intimate personal details of style has come through the radio. In a series of fashion talks being given this month by Ethel Little, fashion editor of the Woman's Home Companion, a definite effort has been made to reach the peak in giving women exactly what they want.

"The caprices of fashion were clearly impressed upon me yesterday when I attended a morning musicale at the Plaza," said Mrs. Little in her latest talk. And she proceeded to describe exactly what every woman was wearing at that important society event, beginning with the costume of Anna Case, the soloist, whose "black satin frock had an interesting fichu of shimmering silver lace, which melted into white near the neck in a most flattering way."

From this musicale, Mrs. Little took her hearers to luncheon at the fashionable Embassy club, and thence to the opening of Douglas Fairbanks' newest photoplay, where the distinguished guests "dressed pretty much as they chose, some in formal clothes, others in afternoon costumes."

In another talk, Mrs. Little's hearers were privileged to attend the opening of a new play; they inspected the wardrobe brought back from Paris by Ruth Elder; they looked over the twenty trunks full of clothes which accompanied the wife of the French Ambassador on her arrival from Paris, they went to the opera, and they talked over furs with the greatest expert in the world.
