

**NEAR CATASTROPHES
NEAR LIBERTYVILLE**

BROKEN RAIL DISCOVERED

**Noticed by Garbage Man Just
In Time to Give Alarm
Before Arrival of
Fast Train**

A catastrophe imperiling the lives of hundreds of passengers on a St. Paul limited train near Libertyville, was averted Friday morning by a matter of seconds. Immediately after the "Sioux," the crack flyer on the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railroad had passed it was discovered that a section of steel rail had been torn loose.

The discovery was made by James Fatz, Libertyville garbage man who had driven his wagon to a point near the tracks to dump a load of ashes. He hurriedly notified John Nickloff, the section foreman, who rushed a gang of men to the scene and replaced the broken rail.

The point where the discovery was made is at the east limits of Libertyville, just east of the Des Plaines river, where the railroad runs upon an embankment with a thirty foot drop on either side.

The limited train No. 22, bound from Chicago to Sioux Falls, S. D., with Janesville, Wis., as the first stop speeds through Libertyville each morning at 7:04 o'clock. It is made up exclusively of Pullmans. Had the rail broken a few seconds sooner the heavy train would have rolled all the way to the foot of the steep embankment with a probable loss of many lives.

Train No. 138, bound from Fox Lake to Chicago, is due to arrive at Libertyville at 7:32 a. m. Had Fatz not discovered the break in the rail when he did the local train would have been rerailed. As it turned out, however, the section men had the new rail in place before the latter train passed through.

**COLLECTING TAXES
IN SEVERAL TOWNS**

**Work to Start in Others as
Soon as Books are Ready;

Collection of 1927 taxes were started in seven townships early last week by J. B. Morse, county treasurer.

Cuba township books went to Miller T. Loney at Barrington Friday and also books to E. Harris, Grayslake, Avon township.

It is not known when Antioch, Libertyville and Grant books will be ready.
