DOWNSTATE FIGHTS REDISTRICTING PLAN

SAYS IT FAVORS CHICAGO

Afraid Big City Would Control State and Dictate All Legislation and Nominate Candidates

If the attempts of Chicago politicians to get the State of Illinois redistricted on a basis of population are successful the legislators from Chicago would then have the power to confiscate down-state property through their control of the power of taxation of the state. This warning to down-state was given out last week at Bloomington when the Down-State Illinois League was launched League officials announced that the pledge of a large number of legislators had been secured that they would not vote for a redistricting of Illinois until such provisions were made in the plan that no single center of population could control the rest of the state.

Fifer Is Prominent One of the first addresses which will be made under the auspicies of the league will be by Former Governor Joseph W. Fifer who has been one of the greatest fighters against Chicago control in this state. Gov. Fifer was a member of the constitutional convention of a few years ago and his debates on the subject of redistriction in the convention and his speeches before the redistricting committees of the house and senate are quoted frequently when public refer-

ence is made in the matter. League officials declared that all legislators and candidates for the legislature will be asked to state their views on the redistricting proposi-

If Chicago Controlled

If Chicago should gain control, the league bulletins state, Chicago would control then the office of governor with the power of veto over all legislation; would control the office of lieutenant, governor, attorney general, treasurer, secretary of state, and superintendent of schools and also the power to elect both U. S. senators and more than half of the congressmen.

With this threat to down-state in view the officers of the league expressed the hope at the opening session that the effort of the league to arouse down-state by speakers, publicity matter, pamphlets, etc., would be sufficient to prevent a repitition of the action of the senate last spring when the members voted 26 to 25 for the resolution favoring Chicago.

FEDERAL AID ROADS IN SEVERAL STATES

Limited to Seven Per Cent of Total Mileage; Modern Methods Used

Federal-aid roads are limited i each State to seven per cent of the total mileage of highways. Each State receives its share. The Government inspects the progress of the work in order that its money may be properly applied.

More than 64,000 miles of Federalaid roads have been completed. The important interstate highways of the country total 185,772 miles; thus the Federal Government has helped build about one-third of the roads. Portland cement concrete roads totaling 14,391 miles; besides 25,547 miles of gravel roads have been built by Government aid.

Picks, axes, shovels, plows, and hand and wheel scrapers were the tools of the farmers who built our first highways so that they could get to the "distant" markets,—only a few miles away.

Road building is an engineering profession. Roads are laid out on blue prints nowadays instead of following the pioneer's blazed trails through forests and countrysides. The old time "under-water," or highway that does not drain off, cannot gain Federal aid. "As the thermometer records temperature, so would this device denote the fitness or unfitness of air for breathing," wrote Ruppe. "We insist upon having our homes properly heated and have a guage by which w regulate them. For the infinitely more vital problem of fresh, pure air

we have no adeyuate measure. "Our senses are poor regulators The impurity of the atmosphere creeps upon us so gradually that we do not realize its danger. I feel safe in saying that not more than one home in a hundred has the requisite amount of oxygen for the maintenance of perfect health.

"If a device such as I suggest for ascertaining the relative purity of the air content were available in a convenient form like the very useful Paper Hanging - Interior Decorating thermometer, it would revolutionize health conditions and its inventor would be hailed as a modern Lord Lister."
