Voting Precincts
The territory covered by the eight voting precincts in Deerfield township and the polling place in each are described as follows:

Precinct No. 1—All city of Highwood and north of Bloom street, on east side of tracks and on west, south to Chicago avenue and west to town line. Polling place, Highwood City Hall.

Precinct No. 2—From Bloom street to Vine avenue, all east of tracks. Polling place, Deerfield-Shields high school.

Precinct No. 3—From Vine avenue to Central avenue, all east of tracks; polling place, H. M. Prior company's office, 27 North Sheridan road.

Precinct No. 4—From Central avenue to Beach street, all east of tracks. Polling place, North Shore Gas Co. office, 47 South St. Johns avenue.

Precinct No. 5—All south of Beach street to town line and east of tracks. Polling place, M. E. Faust's residence, 1545 Judson avenue, Ravinia.

Precinct No. 6—From Chicago avenue south to Elm place and Elm place extended to west line, all west of tracks. Polling place, J. L. Muzik's store, 506 North Green Bay road.

Precinct No. 7—All south from Elm place to Deerfield avenue, all west of tracks. Polling place, Brand Bros. store, 530 Central avenue.

Precinct No. 8—All south of Deer-

field avenue and west of tracks. Polling place, Hines Lumber Co. office Lincoln and Walnut avenues.

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the company was willing to improve the one at Sheridan place, providing the city would pay one-half the cost, about \$10,000, the company bearing the other \$10,000 and the city to defray the cost of the paving in addition. As to the Bloom street and Vine street viaducts it was indicated that nothing could be done at present. A petition from the Automotive Repair Service for permit to install gasoline pumps at their new location on North Second street was referred to the building inspector.

Want to Build Hotel
Messrs. Schneider and Huntley presented a petition for a permit to erect a five-story hotel to contain a hundred rooms at Sheridan and Park avenues. It was explained that the building would be a handsome one with every possible modern equipment and convenience. The corporation counsel recommended that the matter be taken up with the zoning appeal board.

The ordinance abolishing the office of city engineer was passed on final reading with a unanimous vote.


The report of Building Inspector S. D. Morris for the month of March was presented showing permits for building issued during the month for improvements the estimated cost of which totalled \$222,160. The report was placed on file.

Employment of Attorney
A resolution was adopted rescinding a previous one which provided for the employment of Siebel & Severin and Holland M. Cassidy as attorneys to represent the city in the case of Wallen et al. vs. the City of Highland Park, in which the rights of the city in and to the six per cent of the cost of special assessments is questioned.

Another resolution was then adopted providing for the employment of Attorney Arthur Bulkley to take care of the city's interests in the case, it being pointed out that the time of the corporation counsel was fully occupied with other matters of city business.

It has been my privilege during the campaign for coroner—now about to close—to hear many, many expressions of encouragement towards my candidacy from all sections of the county—and it has been said to me many times:

"From what I hear Ed—you will be elected coroner. Your opponent, Taylor, has held this office for 28 years and it's about time he stepped aside to give someone else a chance—and I understand Mr. Taylor for his last two terms has twice broken a promise made to you—that he would not be a candidate—this of course he had a right to do but did not have a moral right. But if he found that he wanted to break his promise—he could have at least treated you fair, Ed, when he filed his petition to again become a candidate. He knew you had waited at the county clerk's office since long before daylight to file—and hours before he arrived with his petition—and he knew as did the county clerk that you were entitled to first position for the office of coroner on the ballot—but in line with his selfish desire to keep on holding this office—he was again so—and cheated you out of your rights—and I admired you, Mr. Conrad, there and then where you retired like a gentleman and accepted your lot—and that act coupled with many other reasons why there should be a change in the coroner's office here made you a good many votes.

"We want a coroner who will be on the job—one who will not hold up inquests for hours and hours—sometimes until the next day while the coroner is taking care of his private business. We want a coroner who will see to it that juries are given a chance to render verdicts now and then that safeguard the interests of the traveling public.

"This talk of Dr. Taylor's that one should be a doctor in order to hold the office of coroner is all 'bunk'—and it is a fact that you can give better service because you are not one. In most cases a doctor is not preferred for coroner. How about Cook County, that important locality wherein lies Chicago? The coroner there is not a doctor nor was the former one. You have been deputy coroner for many years and from what I hear you have shown efficiency and capability far above the average—so much so that you were always very satisfactory to the present incumbent—and there are at least 25 doctors in Lake County who will perform autopsies when necessary and when you ask them to, free of charge.

"Your pledge that you will give all of your time to the duties of the office if elected and your long experience as an undertaker and deputy coroner seem to me to just fit you in every respect to hold the position you now seek—
