MUCH RECLAMATION

Great Benefit Would Accrue to SCOUTS PLANNING States and Nation If Farm Organization Were Better Managed

Few people in America realize the extent of the reclamation work which is being done on much once fertile land in the South which has been practically uncultivated since the Civil War. The government is now busy on the project and an interesting story of what is being accomplished appears in the current issue of the National Republic. It was written by Dr. Elwood Mead, the Commissioner of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, who has covered the entire subpject in an interesting way. Dr. Mead says, in part:
