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NORTHWESTERN PLANS USE GASOLINE CARS

May Try Them Out in Suburban Service, It Is Reported; **Painting Coaches**

The Chicago & North Western rail road is making a survey as to the possibility of using gasoline coaches on the Chicago suburban service President Fred W. Sargent stated last week at the annual stockholders' meeting.

"Our figures on cost and feasibility of more frequent trains will be read in about three months," said President Sargent. "If the engineers believe use of the gasoline-driven coaches such as we are using more and more on branch lines is practicable for suburban service, we shall try a few."

Suburban Business Gaining

President Sargent told the stockholders that suburban business is increasing. The number of rides in February, 1927, he said.

Nothing is being overlooked by the road to save expenses. Millions are being spent in great works, such as the Proviso freight yard, to cut operating costs and where a dollar or two can be saved in the cost of painting coaches or in the attachment of devices to have a few pounds of coal, the changes are made.

The green Pherson. paint, according to C. A. Cairns, passenger traffic manager, will not soil so quickly and hence the cars will not need repainting so often. More than 200 coaches have already been repainted. The color matches the standard Pullman cars.
