NEW OFFICERS CHOSEN FOR DEERFIELD P.T.A.

AT THE MEETING FRIDAY

Delegates Sent to Conferences; Will Buy Electric Clock; Junior Garden Club Notes

The Deerfield P.T.A. held its regular meeting in the school house on Friday afternoon, April 6. Mrs. Homer Cazal, the vice-president, presided.

At the business session, the following officers for the ensuing year were unanimously elected: Mrs. Julian Smith as president, Mrs. W. W. Geary, vice-president; Mrs. Irving Brand, secretary; and Mrs. Leslie Brand, treasurer.

The association voted to send the incoming president, Mrs. Smith, as delegate to the annual conference of the Illinois Council of P.T.A.'s to be held in Streator, April 24, 25 and 26.

In order to raise funds to help pay for the electric clock which is to be purchased for the school, it was voted to hold a card party to be arranged by the finance committee. The chairman, Mrs. W. Koebelin urged all the members to co-operate with the committee and give the affair their hearty support.

A committee was appointed to bring the matter before the school board of dismissing the school one week later in spring and extending the summer vacation one week in the fall. The idea was not to open school the day after Labor Day.

Principal Carl E. Bates and Mrs. Bates were chosen as delegates to the P.T.A. section of the Lake Shore division of the Illinois State Teachers' association, which was held on Monday, April 16, at Waukegan.

Mr. Bates, organizer of the Junior Garden club, hopes to promote and stimulate an interest, love and pride of gardening among the boys, told of what he has accomplished. Thirty boys are as many as he felt he could start with, grouping them according to age. Twenty pupils from the Deerfield school and ten from Wilmot school have joined. They will have their own plot of ground and plant seeds furnished them by the Senior Garden Club of Deerfield. Besides other things, each must plant tomatoes and asters. In the fall, at a garden show, the best tomato and best miscellaneous bouquet will be awarded prizes as well as for the best essay on "My Garden."

The senior Garden Club will also furnish the prizes and Mr. Bates will be the judge.

A paper which traced all great authors through the ages who were keen observers of nature and whose poems were rich in nature's background, read by Miss Leona Evans, brought the meeting to a close.

STUDENT'S EYESIGHT RUINED BY JAVELIN

A serious accident, which resulted in the complete loss of one eye by a student at the Libertyville high school, marred the first track meet held this year on the local field. The injured boy is Herman Amann of Mundelein, who was struck by a thrown javelin, the point penetrating the eye socket and destroying the eye ball.

The accident, which was the result of an almost impossible combination of circumstances, occurred just before the javelin throw, which was scheduled about the middle of the meet. Some of the contestants were warming up with a few practice throws and Amann, who was to act as one of the judges in measuring the distances, stepped on the field to recover a spear thrown by Spellman, just as a Barrington man made a throw.

At the cry from the bystanders Amann looked up just in time to receive the full force of the thrown javelin directly in the eye. He was knocked to the ground by the force of the blow and Spellman, the first man to reach him, pulled the spear from the wound.

TAYLOR NOMINATED AGAIN FOR CORONER

Defeats Nearest Competitor by More Than 2,000 Votes in Primary Election

Dr. John L. Taylor of Libertyville, coroner of Lake county for the past 28 years, and Charles E. Russell of Lake Forest, county surveyor for the past 16 years, were renominated in last week's primary. Doctor Taylor won out over a field of five candidates and Russell was victorious over three opponents.

Coroner Taylor received 3,742 votes more than his closest opponent, Edward Conrad. Russell finished 4,420 votes ahead of Ben P. Thacker, who ran second in the surveyor race. Coroner Taylor received a vote of 9,709, while the combined vote of his four opponents was 13,699. Russell's total vote was 9,677, while the aggregated vote of his three opponents was 10,555.

BRIG. GEN. EDDY DIES AT HOME IN GLENCOE

Brig. Gen. James M. Eddy, retired Illinois National Guard officer, died at his home, 543 Oakdale avenue, Glencoe, last week. General Eddy was born in Warren, R. I. He was 70 years old and had been ill for several months. He had had a long and honorable military career. He enlisted in the old First Illinois Infantry, December 13, 1879, and, passing through the intervening grades, was a Major in command of the first battalion during the Spanish war and saw service at Santiago Le Cuba. He was Lieutenant Colonel of the 131st infantry in the World war and fought at Chipilly Ridge and in the Meuse-Argonne battle.

Funeral services were held Thursday at Graceland cemetery, with military honors by his old regiment.

REVIEW OF RESULTS OF PRIMARY VOTING

IN COUNTY AND DISTRICT

Lyons, McDonough, Jackson for Representatives; Paddock for State Senator; Figures Are Given

Richard J. Lyons, real estate dealer of Mundelein, won out over Charles Francis of McHenry county for third place in the Republican representative race by 196½ votes, according to official votes of the counties of McHenry and Boone and the unofficial Lake county vote. This is 88 votes less than the unofficial vote of the three counties Wednesday showed Lyons to have beaten Francis. The canvass of votes in Lake county was to be completed late Thursday, but no change of any consequence are expected in the representative race.

The other two Republicans nominated are Lee McDonough, owner of a plumbing establishment in Waukegan and N. L. Jackson of Boone county. The later has been a member of the legislature for several years.

Democratic Nominees
 Thomas Bolger of McHenry county has been nominated in the representative race on the Democratic ticket. This was an upset, as it was generally expected in Democratic circles that either Thomas E. Graham of Ingleside, or Charles Wightman of Grayslake, would win the nomination. The small Democratic vote resulted in the defeat of the Lake county men. The official votes of McHenry and Boone counties shows Bolger's total in these counties to be 1,184. Graham received 212 and Wightman 220 in McHenry and Boone counties. Because of the scattering Democratic vote, it is impossible as yet to give Democratic totals in the legislative race. However, the small vote in Lake county makes it impossible for either Graham or Wightman to overcome the vote of Bolger in the other counties.

In McHenry and Boone
 The official vote of McHenry and Boone counties and the unofficial Lake county vote shows Ray Paddock of Wauconda to have defeated Senator Swift carried both McHenry and Boone county by 29 votes and McHenry county by 1,043. The unofficial vote Wednesday showed Swift loser in Boone county by 94 votes. The unofficial Lake county votes gives Paddock a majority of 1,409. The total vote of the Republican candidates for state senator and representative, as shown by the official McHenry and Boone county votes and the unofficial vote in Lake county follows:

BUILD FIRST SECTION ROUTE 173 THIS YEAR

Initial Link in Rockford-Zion Road to Be Paved by State During Summer

Construction this summer of the first link in the Rockford-Zion City cement highway, known as state highway route 173 was assured Saturday when the state highway department opened bids on the construction of cement paving and bridges between Caledonia and Harvard the total cost of which will be approximately \$345,000.

Start Shortly
 The stretch of fifteen miles from Caledonia, in Boone county, to Harvard, in McHenry county, a distance of 15 miles, will be started at once, highway officials declare.

When the bids were opened at Springfield last week, the S. & H. Construction Co. of Milwaukee and the Lampert Construction Co. of Oshkosh, Wis., were the apparent low bidders on paving. The Milwaukee firm bid \$162,586.90 on the contract to build 8.37 miles of the Harvard-

Caledonia cement ribbon and the Lampert firm bid \$124,411.41 on the remaining 6.51 mile stretch.

Two Big Bids
 Low bidders on the construction of bridges along the Caledonia-Harvard route were the J. C. Fairco Co., Champaign, \$23,999.70, on a bridge in section 130; and the same firm with a bid of \$34,120.92 for a bridge in section 131.

It is expected the formal letting of contracts to these firms will be made in a few days.

The Harvard-Caledonia stretch will be the first link in the Zion City-Rockford highway to be laid by

the state. The highway route, which connects with North Second street, road opposite the Tampa Gardens road house, extends in a northeastern direction to Caledonia, then to Harvard and straight east to Zion City.
