Following are some of the features of the business sessions of the conference:

Conference Features

William T. Bedford, president of the La Salle Rotary club, which, with the Peru club was host to the conference, on behalf of both clubs extended the Rotary welcome to the delegates when the business sessions of the conference started at Matthiessen Memorial auditorium at 1:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. He was followed by Joseph S. Brzygot, mayor of La Salle, who officially welcomed the Rotarians to La Salle.

The conference was opened with several selections by the La Salle-Peru high school orchestra and the singing of "America" by the delegates, led by John Massieon, of the Peru club.

Harry S. Kramer, of East St. Louis, widely known banker and treasurer of the Illinois Crippled Children's society, an organization

sponsored by Rotary International, reported that complete re-organization of the society has been effected during the past year. The society, founded five years ago, is now being operated on a sound and highly satisfactory basis, he said.

For Crippled Children

Clinics have been established in more than a dozen cities throughout the state, which has been divided by the society into four sections, with an expert orthopedist stationed at central points in each section. Orthopedists of the society are now located at Peoria, Chicago, Springfield and East St. Louis.

Clinical attention is given crippled children free of charge and the society is kept in preparation by donations from the Rotary membership and through contributions from interested persons outside the Rotary organization. Last year, if all the children treated in the society's clinics had paid for this service, Mr. Kramer asserted, it would have cost them approximately \$25,000.

Trip to Starved Rock

A score or more of the delegates, after the conference were taken in automobiles to Starved Rock on a sight-seeing trip, returning in time for the Governor's Dinner, which was

served at the Kaskaskia hotel, conference headquarters, at 6:30 o'clock.

Approximately 500 persons attended the Governor's dinner served in the grill room and dining room of the Kaskaskia hotel. While dinner was served the Frank Bennett Concert Company, of Chicago, composed of four persons, sang several selections.

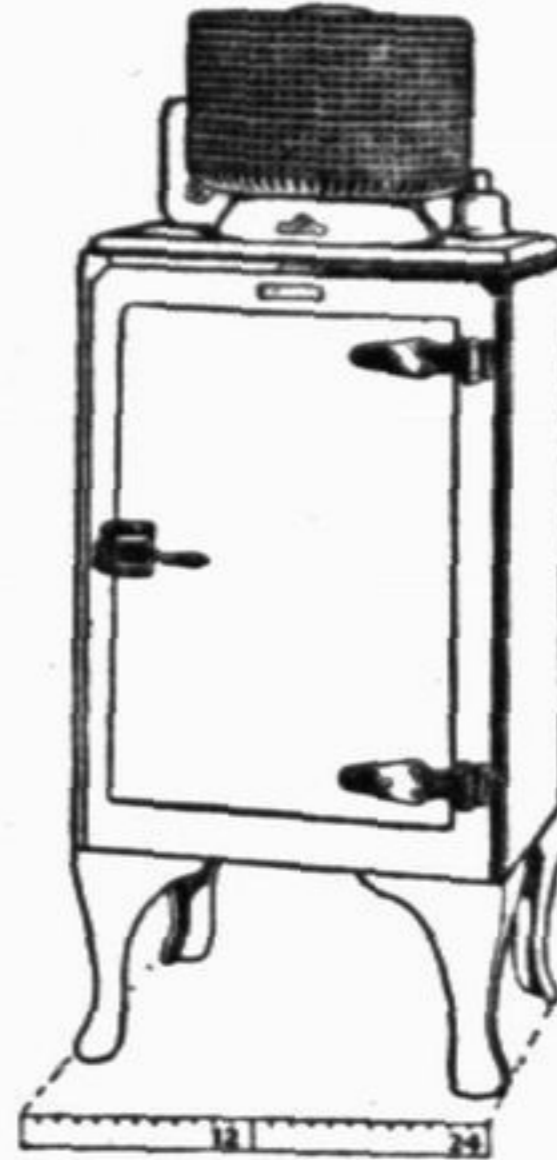

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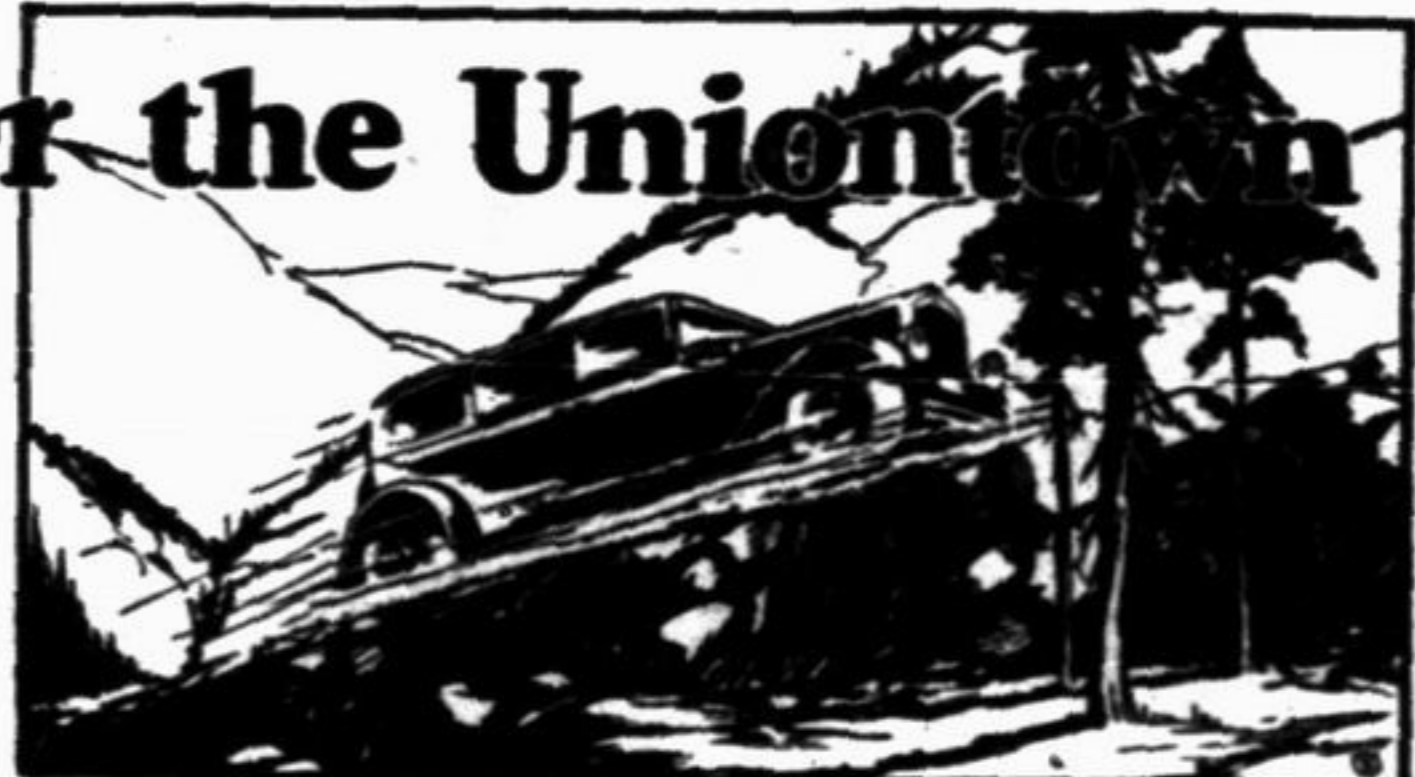
