MISSISSIPPI BRIDGES

From the source of the Mississippi river, far up in the wilds of northern Minnesota, to the Gulf of Mexico more than 120 bridges, large and small, have been thrown across the Father of Waters. They range from the 12-foot crossing at Bena, near the headwaters, to the huge spans at St. Paul, St. Louis and Memphis. Several toll bridges are still operated, but for the most part they have been done away with. Bridge building over the Mississippi began before the Civil war, when trade and industry were pushing westward across the virgin prairies. Railroads were among the first to span the great waterway. Several bridges built in the early days are still in use.

BUILDING AND LOAN GAINS

An increase of more than \$32,000,000 in the total assets of the state building and loan associations will be reported by Oscar Nelson, state auditor of public accounts, in his report for the fiscal year ending December 1, 1927, to be published soon. The report, covering the financial condition of 910 institutions, will show an increase of 31 associations during the year. Total assets of building and loan associations, according to Auditor Nelson's figures, were \$388,097,831.34, an increase of \$32,588,530.63 for the year. The 421 associations in Cook county show an increase of \$6,081,295.05 and the 489 downstate associations increased their assets \$26,507,235.58. There were 9,209,431 shares in force, a gain of 548,960 shares.

AIRPLANE TOUR OF STATE

An airplane tour of the state to promote trade and aviation development has been announced by the Illinois Chamber of Commerce, Chicago. Tentative plans call for thirty planes to participate, starting about June 20. The planes will visit more than twenty-five cities, including Springfield, Peoria, Decatur, Champaign, East St. Louis, Cairo, Moline, Rockford and others not yet selected. Assistant Secretary of Commerce McCracken, head of the aviation, has approved the flight and will accompany the ships.
