#### CHURCH AGED MAN BUILT BURNED; HE PLANS ANEW

#### He Toiled Years to Erect To Fulfill Vow

An old man hooked his toil-worn hands into the pockets of his sheepskin coat, calmly surveyed the smoke blackened rocks and charred timbers of what had been the Church of Our Lady of Sorrows in Livingston, N. J., today and told Father Gaetano Severazza, pastor of the ruined church, that it would be rebuilt.

The old man was Achilles D'Amato and the ruins before him represented several years of hard work, some thousand of dollars as yet unpaid and the fulfillment of a promise that he made as his son Michael went off to war. If Michael returned he promised the Virgin Mother he would build a May 13 is Mother's Day. Michael came back safely and worked with his father carrying stones from nearby fields for the foundation of the shrine or hewing timbers as the work progressed. Last Decoration Day the church was given to Mgr. John A. Duffy, acting Bishop of Newark. Father Sverazza was assigned to the parish that numbered nearly 300 Catholics and the old man, proud of the fulfillment of his promise, gave a small house to the priest for his home.

Last week a fire started near the electric wires in the roof. In a few moments the whole structure was ablaze. The single fire truck of the volunteer fire department was of no avail. The church burned to the stone foundation.

The church had been insured by the bishop a few days before the dedication and the money will be turned over for the erection of a new shrine on the site of the one destroyed yesterday.
