### W. C. T. U. CONFERENCE HELD HERE LAST WEEK

The W. C. T. U. conference of Lake Forest, Deerfield and Highland Park was held at the Y.W.C.A. in Highland Park, last week.

The attendance was good and great interest and enthusiasm manifested in both sessions.

In the morning, Mrs. R. E. Thomas of Waukegan, State Director of Economics of Prohibition, talked on "What prohibition has done." She said "Poverty from intemperance has declined; divorce having as its cause intemperance, has decreased by 60% and the American people are six billion dollars a year better off, since the 18th amendment was adopted.

The State President, Miss Helen Hood, gave an address on "Our Political Situation." She stated that from her observation at the Republican Convention at Springfield, where she was a delegate, "what we need is a law to send back foreigners, who come here to violate our laws, who are not Americans and never intend to be."

She felt sure of Louis Emmerson as a dry man, also Wm. Stratton. Otis Glenn had stated he was not fanatically dry, but he is against the saloon. She put the dry stamp on Ruth Hanna McCormick and Henry Rathbone, and mentioned favorably Frank Lowden and Herbert Hoover as possible Presidential Candidates.

In the afternoon Rev. Frank Fitt, gave a review of Herman Feldman's book, "Prohibition in its Economic Aspects." Some figures he gave were since national prohibitions milk consumption has increased 50 per cent; gingerale 100 per cent; root beer 100 per cent; candy 25 per cent; ice cream 55 per cent. Near beer is not a new product, but has been made for 30 years. The Anheuser Busch Brewery of St. Louis turned out 3 car loads of near beer to 4 car loads of real beer in fore-prohibition days.

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
