VERCOES HEADS FINANCE

Chairman for 4th Year: Other Important Appointments By Chairman of Supervisors; The List

Supervisor Arthur W. Vercoe of Highland Park, chairman of the finance committee of the board of supervisors for the past three years and Supervisor H. C. W. Meyer of Mundelein, a member of the finance committee during this same period, were again appointed as chairman and member, respectively, on the finance committee for the ensuing year.

During the time Vercoe and Meyer have been on the finance committee, the indebtedness of Lake county has been materially reduced and the plan is to keep reducing the economy program started two years ago. The finance committee in the past has been composed of three members. This year there are four on the committee. The new members are Supervisor Emil Ficke of Lake Zurich and Assistant Supervisor John D. Thomas of Zion.

Other Committees

There are 33 standing committees while the board membership excluding the chairman is 33 and each was given a committee chairmanship. With the exception of five members, who were named on four committees including the one on which they serve as chairman, each board member was named on three committees.

Supervisor Frank Stanton of Ingleside was made chairman of the road and bridge committee, a most important committee. During the past year Ray Paddock, who has retired from the board, served as chairman of the road and bridge committee. Assistant John Hoban of Waukegan was named chairman of the purchasing committee, another leading committee.

PRIMARY ELECTION EXPENSE IN COUNTY

Total Cost Over Eight Thousand Dollars, Clerk Reports; Board To Pay

Cost of the last primary of April 10, according to the best figures obtainable from County Clerk Lew A. Hendee, was \$8,691.80. The board of supervisors at their meeting last week voted to pay all of these bills.

Each precinct, and there are 62 in the county with 22 being in Waukegan township, cost about \$93 for the primary. Three judges and three clerks operated in each precinct and they received \$12 each, or two days pay.

Cost of printing specimen ballots, posting notices, taking out the metal polling booths, carrying out ballots, etc. ran \$2,925.80.

The board also fixed the salaries of the board of review which will be appointed in late June. These run the same as those for the last board and are:

Chairman \$8 a day, members \$7, assistant clerk \$7, and extra clerk \$5.

PUBLIC SERVICE CO. ERECTS NEW BUILDING

Starts Structure at Libertyville Last Week to Cost About \$150,000

Work was started last week in preparation for the construction of the new \$150,000 building of the Public Service Company which is to be erected during the next few months at the corner of Milwaukee avenue and Church street, Libertyville.

The ground is being cleared by the large house which for many years has stood on the property.

The work on the new business block will start as soon as the ground is cleared and it is expected to be ready for occupancy some time during the autumn of this year.

The building is to be of brick construction with stone and brick trim and will have a slate roof and will be of old English type combining beauty and utility. It will have a frontage of 167½ feet on the Milwaukee avenue side and will extend 76 feet on Church street with stores and offices opening on both streets.

GLENN NOT LIKELY TO BE APPOINTED

Indications Governor Will Not Fill Second Senate Seat Before Election

The second Illinois seat in the United States senate will remain empty until the November election as Governor Len Small has no intention of appointing a successor to Frank L. Smith, it was indicated at Gov. Small's office last week.

It was pointed out that Smith and Small have been political allies for years and the governor has no intention of asking Smith to relinquish the credentials which the senate refused to accept.

Otis F. Glenn, successful republican senatorial nominee in the recent primary, has been one of Small's harshest critics in the state senate and it was said his appointment to fulfill the unexpired term was very unlikely.

AWARD CONTRACT FOR STATE ROUTE

PART OF 172 IN LAKE CO.

Five Mile Strip Between Libertyville and Gurnee to Be Constructed; Clear Right-of-Way Obstacles

The division of highways Thursday announced the awarding of the contract for construction of a pavement project in Lake County, Route 172, Section 128, a five mile strip between Libertyville and Gurnee, to Darrow & Barron of Waukegan. The contract price is \$162,527.29.

The Waukegan contracting firm has informed County Highway Superintendent Ralph M. Lobdell that work will be started immediately on this paving improvement and will be rushed to completion. The pavement is to be 18 feet in width.

It was feared for a time that the county would lose this job, which is to be paid for out of the \$100,000,000 road bond issue.

Lobdell appealed to the board of supervisors about a week ago to take action in this matter and a right-of-way committee was appointed by Chairman Thomas V. Murphy and succeeded in getting all objectors to give right-of-way needed. Ray Paddock, republican nominee for state senator, made a trip to Springfield last week and made arrangements with the state highway department to have the contract for this job awarded.

Paddock and Lobdell Thursday arranged to have a committee of five real estate men in and around Wauconda make an appraisal of property of objectors in Wauconda township, which is needed for right-of-way for Rout 176, Section A, from Mundelein to Wauconda. Paddock says that the township of Wauconda will offer to pay these objectors the price appraised and if they refuse to accept, condemnation proceedings will then be instituted against them.

BOEYE SURRENDERS BOND IS FURNISHED

J. J. Boeye, Evanston chiropractor, who is charged with practicing without a license in connection with the death of Margaret Bremer, Highland Park child, last week was surrendered to Justice Hervey Coulson through his attorney, Walter M. Givler.

Boeye gave a cash bond of \$200 for his appearance for hearing May 3.

The girl had died March 2, of diphtheria, the inquest showed. The warrant was issued at the order of States Attorney Smith March 15 and since then Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle has searched for the man.

The first definite word of him came two days ago when John W. Follmer, of the state department of registration and education, telephoned from Chicago and stated that Boeye would surrender.

The bond was supplied by one of the chiropractor's friends who stated that he lived in Evanston.

GRASS LAKE RESORT OWNER DIED RECENTLY

Louis Rothers, Jr., better known to intimates as "Butch," and one of the best known sportsmen and resort keepers in Lake county, died at the Victory Memorial hospital last week, following an operation. He was 36 years of age.

The deceased, popular because of his joviality and his knowledge of outdoor sports, was for ten years manager of Rothers Resort at Grass Lake near Antioch, which is frequented each year by hundreds of duck hunters and other sportsmen.

TRUCK DRIVER MEETS DEATH AT CROSSING

Jack Koek, 36 years old, trucking contractor of 136 School street, Libertyville, was fatally injured early last week when he drove his five ton truck in front of a speeding Chicago and St. Paul passenger train at St. Mary's road located two miles east of Libertyville.

Death came the following day at the Victory Memorial hospital.

The inquest was held Thursday and the jury returned a verdict of accidental death. A recommendation was made that the railroad company be compelled to install a warning signal at this crossing.

STANDARD TIME FOR COUNTY BOND ELECTION

On recommendation of State's Attorney A. V. Smith the county board last week decided to go by standard time rather than daylight saving time in the election to be held on Tuesday, May 15, on the \$250,000 poor farm bond issue proposition. The polls will be open between the hours of 7 a. m. and 7 p. m., standard time, which is one hour behind daylight saving time.

WOODSTOCK MAN MAY RUN AS INDEPENDENT

Contest for election to the state legislature, which has been regarded as a possibility now seems a certainty for Lee McDonough of Waukegan, Richard Lyons of Mundelein, and Noyes L. Jackson, the three candidates nominated on the republican ticket for the office, according to advices coming from Woodstock, says the Waukegan Sun.

Carl E. Swanson, secretary of the Woodstock association of Commerce and an influential figure in McHenry county is to seek election to the office as an independent.

Political leaders of McHenry county were much disappointed and somewhat chagrined when a McHenry candidate for the first time in many years failed to place in the list of successful nominees for the office of state representative.

It is understood that Swanson has the backing of practically all influential organizations in McHenry county and he will have to be reckoned with in the election.

SLIDES INTO PULLEY, LOSES TWO FINGERS

Becoming frightened at the sight of a 500 foot slide down a wire near the Vulcan Louisville Smelting plant in North Chicago, and failing to let go before reaching the pulley at the lower end of the wire, Edward Skiera, 11 years old of 102 Morrow avenue, North Chicago, had three fingers on one hand and two fingers on the other ground off by the pulley late last week.

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
