IN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF CITY OFFICERS AND CERTAIN EM-PLOYEES OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, ILLINOIS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK: SECTION I-That the salaries of the following City Officers and employees, for the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1928, and ending April 30th, 1929, be fixed at such sum as is provided for by this ordinance for such officer or employe for the discharge of the duties of such office, as required under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the ordinances of the City of Highland Park, during the term of his office or employment, and no further compensation from the City of Highland Park for the duties of such office during the term thereof.



That Is, Not as Personal Prop. erty; Some Variance is Pointed Out

Thirteen states do not tax the automobile as personal property, according to the Chicago Motor club: Delaware, Idaho, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Vermont. The South Dakota exemption applies only to motor vehicles registered before May 1st of the current registration year.
