AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF CITY OFFICERS AND CERTAIN EMPLOYEES OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, ILLINOIS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

SECTION 1.—That the salaries of the following City Officers and employees, for the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1928, and ending April 30th, 1929, be fixed at such sum as is provided for by this ordinance for such officer or employee for the discharge of the duties of such office, as required under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the ordinances of the City of Highland Park, during the term of his office or employment, and that such officer or employee shall receive no further compensation from the City of Highland Park for the duties of such office during the term thereof.

That the salary of the Mayor be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.

That the salary of each of the Commissioners be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Clerk be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Corporation Counsel be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Treasurer be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Collector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Police Sergeants Number One, Two and Three be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2160.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Police Officers Number One, Two and Four be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2160.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Chief Engineer of the Water Works be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$3200) per annum.

That the salary of the First, Second and Third Assistant Engineers at the Water Works be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2160.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Foreman of Streets and Public Improvements be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Chief Engineer in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$1820.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Foreman of Sewer and Water Mains be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$2750.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Stenographer in the City Clerk's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Clerk's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Chief Fire Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the First Assistant Fire Marshal in charge of the Fire Station (during the day) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$2700.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Second Assistant Fire Marshal in charge of the Fire Station (during the night) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$2100.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Firemen Number One, Two, Three and Four be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Forty Dollars (\$2040.00) per annum.

That the salary of Fireman Number Five be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the General Helper in the Water Department be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Bookkeeper in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Assistant in the Building Inspector's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the President of the Board of Health be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Visiting Nurse be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Moving Picture Censor be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) per annum.

SECTION 2.—That the salaries provided for in Section One of this ordinance shall be due and payable in semi-monthly installments on the first and fifteenth day of each month for the preceding half month of their services during the term of their office.

SECTION 3.—That the salary of the Mayor, Commissioner City Clerk, Corporation Counsel, President of the Board of Health, City Marshal, Police Sergeants, City Police Officers, Stenographer in the City Clerk's Office and Visiting Nurse shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Public Affairs.

That the salary of the City Treasurer and City Collector shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Accounts and Finance.

That the salary of the Foreman of Sewer and Water Mains, Chief Engineer at the Water Works, First, Second, and Third Assistants at the Water Works, General Helper in the Water Department, Chief Fire Marshal, Day and Night Firemen at the Fire Station, Firemen Number One, Two, Three, Four and Five, Building Inspector, Assistant in the Building Department, and Moving Picture Censor shall be paid from the Salary Fund provided for in the Department of Public Health and Safety.

That the salary of the Foreman of Streets and Public Improvements and the Chauffeur Mr. Verena Hathaway, Streets and Public Improvements shall be paid from the Salary Fund provided for in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements.

That the salary of the man in charge of the Garbage Incinerator shall be paid from the Garbage Fund.
