PROPOSES WIDENING OF SEVEN HIGHWAYS

Widening of seven great highways leading out of Chicago to a minimum of 40 feet was proposed Wednesday night by the directors of the Chicago Motor club.

In a resolution the club directors called for the widening to extend 100 miles into northern Illinois. Chas. M. Hayes, president of the club, declared that he is prepared to use every resource of the club to further the plans.

The seven radial roads which it is proposed to widen are:

Waukegan road (U. S. 41)—From the Cook county line to Milwaukee. Northwest Highway — Through Crystal Lake and Harvard to Madison, Wis.

Lake street Highway — Through Elgin, Marengo, and to Rockford and Dubuque.

Roosevelt road—Through Geneva, DeKalb and Dixon to Clinton.

Ogden avenue — Through Naperville, Aurora, Plano and Sandwich.

Joliet road—Through Lyons, Lockport and Joliet, and to Ottawa, Starved Rock and central Illinois.

State Highway No. 1 — Through Blue Island, Chicago Heights, Watsessa, Danville, and to the Ohio river.

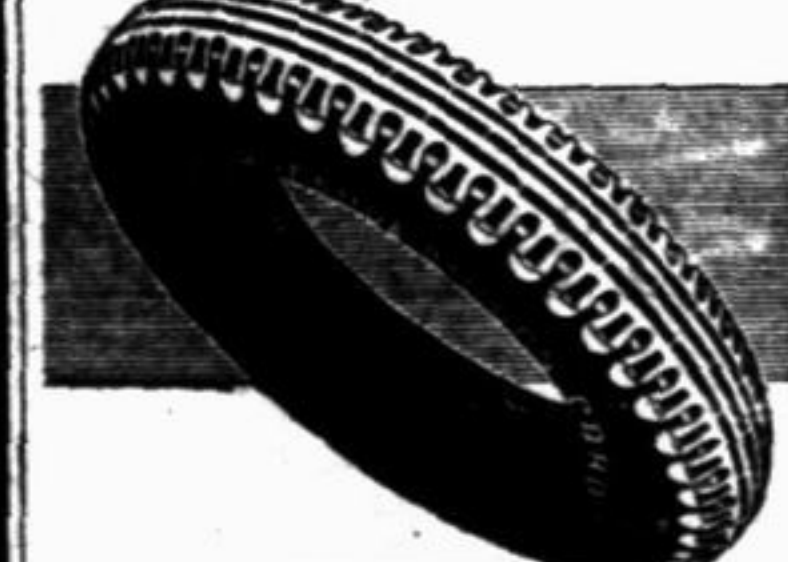
