CULINARY HINTS

Colonial Cookies
1/2 cup shortening.
1/2 cup granulated sugar.
1/2 cup brown sugar.
1 egg yolk.
1/2 cup sour cream.
1/2 cup rolled oats.
1/2 cup boiling water.
4 cups flour.
1 teas. baking powder.
1 teas. salt.
1/2 cup raisins (chopped).
1/2 cup walnuts (broken)
1 teas. vanilla.
Cream shortening and sugar together and then add the egg yolk and sour cream. Scald the rolled oats with boiling water and add to first mixture with the flour, which has been sifted and mixed with baking soda, salt, raisins and nuts. Add vanilla. Have the dough as soft as can be handled. Bake in a moderate oven about 12 minutes. Keep in a crock. These cookies improve with age. This recipe makes four dozen average size cookies.

Mexican Salad
4 medium size tomatoes.
3 small green peppers.
1 medium size onion.
2 cucumbers.
1 cup chopped celery or spring cabbage.
Remove skins of tomatoes by holding over flame. Set in refrigerator to grow firm after skinning. Peel cucumbers and put to soak, without slicing, in ice water. Remove seeds from peppers. About an hour before serving time, chop onion and peppers into small pieces. Slice, not too thin, the tomatoes and the cucumbers. Arrange lettuce leaves in salad bowl, put in the sliced tomatoes, then the sliced cucumber, and pile the mixed onion, cabbage and peppers in center. Cover with horseradish dressing made as follows: one cup thick cream, a tablespoon freshly grated horseradish, two tablespoons lemon juice, salt and cayenne to taste. Beat until thick.

Boy Scout News

Several hundred north shore scouts gathered last Saturday at the cabin in the woods to participate in the annual fun rally. The features of the afternoon were a foolishness parade, shoe scramble and wool hunt. A court of award and many troop picnics followed the afternoon activities. Every scoutmaster and assistant scoutmaster is looking forward to the scoutmasters' monthly round table to be held Monday evening, May 21, at the cabin in the woods. Scoutmasters and assistants and troop committeemen are signing up for a week-end trip to Camp Checaugua, Owasippe, Mich. The group will leave on Friday night and return early Monday morning. Scouts are registering for periods of a few days or a week or more to be spent at the cabin in the woods, west of Glencoe some time during the summer. The camp opens on Monday, June 11, with a full program of fun and scouting opportunities. All scouts who play the fife, drum or bugle and also those who are interested in learning to play these instruments are to report on Friday June 1st, at 7:30 o'clock at the Glencoe Union church, Glencoe. All buglers and drummers should be sure to bring their drums and bugles with them. We are going to organize a north shore area fife, drum and bugle corps. All scoutmasters are requested to announce and to call the attention of their scouts who are interested in becoming members of this drum and bugle corps to be present at this meeting. The temporary summer camp at the cabin in the woods in the boy scout reservation in the forest preserve, is conducted throughout the summer for the use of troops, patrols, and individual scouts. It is planned to erect four tent houses, screened, each to accommodate 8 scouts and a patrol leader. Twenty-four scouts will also be cared for in the cabin, making a total capacity of fifty scouts and leaders. The camp will be conducted under the supervision of the scout executive, Walter McPeck, and the north shore area council camp committee. The camp director will be W. Ted Grant.

WISCONSIN GAME LAW RULES ON FISHING

There has been a good deal of discussion among fishermen lately as to the date when the law permits the taking of game fish in Wisconsin waters, especially in Delavan and Geneva lakes. The fishing season for game fish with the exception of black bass will open on May 25. This includes pickerel, pike, rock bass, perch, sunfish, roach, etc. Other small fish such as strawberry bass, calico bass, coppers, silver bass, etc., may be taken at any time of the year. The black bass season opens on June 20 in all parts of Wisconsin with the exception of Mississippi river waters where it opens on June 15, and Green Lake, where it opens July 1st. The legal limit is ten inches and the bag ten a day. All over 16 years of age are compelled to secure licenses. The fee remains at \$3 for non-residents. Residents of Wisconsin do not have to buy a license. With each license is supplied a label button about three-quarters of an inch across with red, white and black colors, which can be distinguished at some distance by a fish warden.

RURAL SCHOOLS TO GRADUATE OVER 400

Preparations to graduate over 400 students from the eight grades of the village and rural schools of Lake county are being made today by T. A. Simpson, county superintendent of schools. The anticipated graduating number is slightly in excess of last year's classes. The earliest schools through the county will start closing about May 25 while the last will close by June 10, he declared.
