An American was fined \$18 for taking bootleg liquor into England. Probably he was prosecuted under the "defense of the realm" act.



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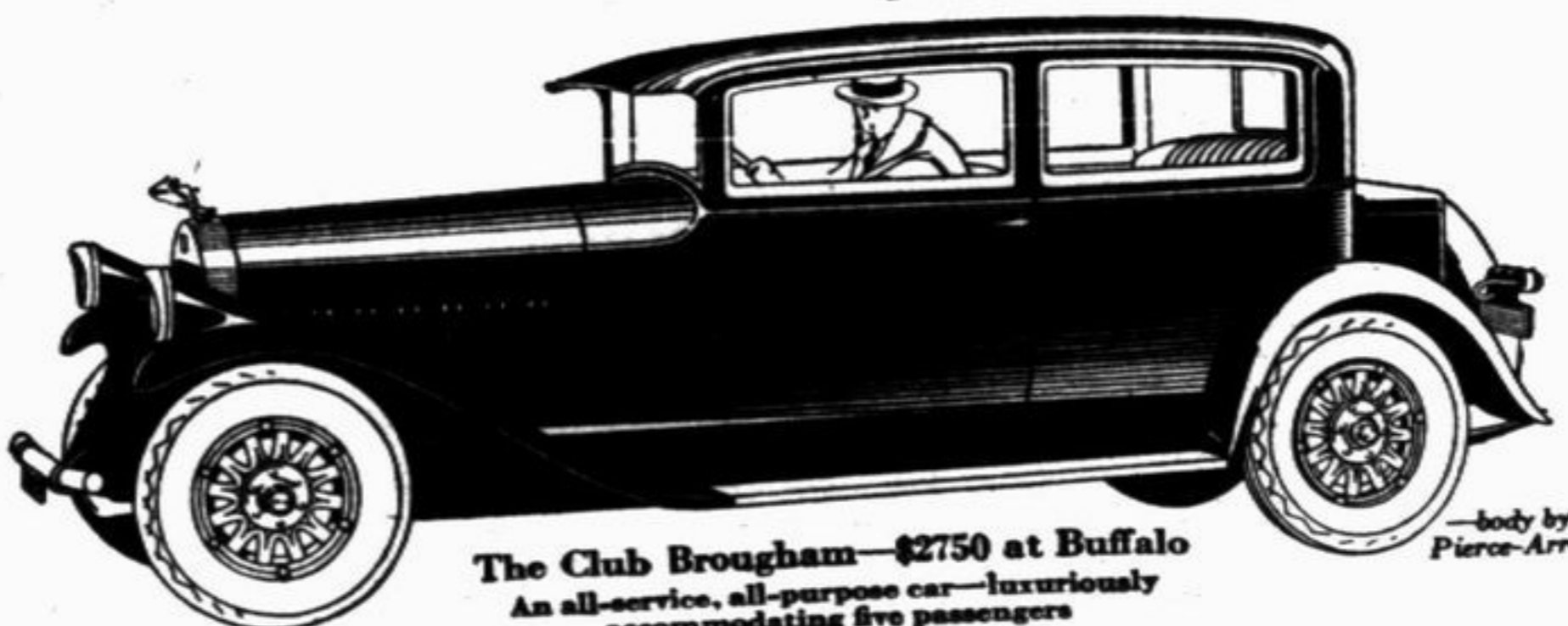


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
