**HOLD POPPY DAY IN DEERFIELD MAY 26**

**Urge Everyone to Purchase Poppies to Wear on Memorial Day**

The war is not over! Despite all statements to the contrary, the war is not over, and will not be over, while there are still living those who have suffered because of it. True, enemies are forgotten and gone, and Peace reigns, but the greatest responsibility of war, the task of caring for those who are no longer able to care for themselves, remains. On Poppy Day, the American Legion Auxiliary Unit No. 738 presents to the people of Deerfield an opportunity to aid in this great task.

In Flanders Fields  
(The author of this poem, Lieut. Col. John McCrae, a member of the First Canadian contingent, died in France on January 28, 1918, after four years of service on the western front.)

In Flanders fields the poppies blow  
Between the crosses, row on row,  
That mark our place; and in the sky  
The larks, still bravely singing, fly  
Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago  
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,  
Loved and were loved, and now we lie

In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe;  
To you from failing hands we throw  
The torch; be yours to hold it high.

If ye break faith with us who die  
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow  
In Flanders fields.

Shall we not continue to hold high  
The Torch of Service to Those Who  
Have Suffered? Every cent contributed to the Poppy Day Fund is used to keep the faith with our honored dead—to brighten the lives and lighten the load, for their loved ones and for their comrades.

Then let us remember: By buying a Poppy we show our desire to aid in the great work of Rehabilitation; by wearing the Poppy on Memorial Day we show our respect for those who lie in Flanders Fields.

The Memorial Day Committee requests that everyone, and especially the members of the American Legion and Auxiliary, wear the Poppy on Memorial Day, May 30, as well as on Poppy Day, May 26.

The committee in charge of the market, Mesdames R. W. Farmer, F. J. O'Connor, and William Macdonald have planned to have perennials, annuals and cut flowers of every kind and color reasonably priced. No plants or flowers will be set aside at the opening of the Garden Market for late afternoon purchase.

The Garden Club of Deerfield has arranged for a competent man to be on hand to test soils. He will also be glad to discuss plant feeding problems with you and answer questions concerning care of lawns, flowers and shrubbery. Merely bring a tablespoonful of soil, being sure to put it in a clean paper bag. The test will take but a few minutes. It is free of charge and it will tell you whether or not you need lime, and how much.
