Committee on County Board to Refer Matter of Sheriff's Request for Six to Full Board

After hearing Sheriff Doolittle's request for motor-cops to aid in regulating county traffic to keep down accidents the members of the jail and finance committee adjourned until the June meeting of the board of supervisors without giving an answer. Before going into session Supervisor Arthur W. Vercoe, of Highland Park, chairman of the finance committee, had said that a force of

four men would be allowed and that no more would be added due to the financial condition of the county. Wanted Six

The sheriff had wished for six motor-cops. He planned on two for Sheridan road, two for Rand road and two for Green Bay road. The men would ride in pairs as nearly as possible as a safety measure.

The sheriff would use the patrol for a dual purpose.

In the first place the men would be on the road to regulate traffic by cutting down unnecessary speeding, reckless and drunken driving and general traffic cutting so as to eliminate as many accidents as possible.

Secondly they would be used for crime prevention, such as restricting booze traffic, banditry along the highway, and answering emergency calls.

As a secondary force to the regular personnel of deputies the sheriff believes that it would give him a far greater opportunity in keeping down crime and accidents.

May Allow Four Vercoe had stated that the board would probably allow four men for June, July and August and additional riders for holidays.

The sheriff, in the last few weeks, has received 63 applications from men seeking positions as motorcycle riders.

The rush for the jobs, that might and might not be, has been so heavy that it has become a nuisance. Only the names and addresses of the applicants are being taken and no encouragement offered.


