TWO MEN DROWNED IN SLOCUM LAKE

Double Tragedy Last Week Is Witnessed by Many On Shore There

Two men were drowned and one saved in Slocum Lake, near Wauconda, Memorial day when a boat from which they were fishing capsized.

Those who lost their lives were: John Resch, 29, of 1315 George Street, Chicago.

Clarence Lutz, 20, of 1303 Wolf-ram Avenue, Chicago.

The man saved was Walter Resch, 24, John's brother.

The accident happened at nine o'clock in the morning, according to Deputy Edward Dunne. He stated that witnesses from the shore told him that the three young men were standing in the boat fishing.

The next thing the knew the boat was over and the three men were struggling for their lives. Walter was able to reach the boat and hang on until help arrived.

At an inquest conducted by Coroner J. L. Taylor a verdict of accidental death from drowning was returned.

VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL OPENS JUNE 25

Open to Children of All Faiths; Held at Presbyterian Church

On June twenty-fifth a Vacation Church School will be opened in the Highland Park Presbyterian church. Children of all faiths are invited to attend this school where trained teachers who are experts in their fields will conduct the work of each department.

The educational program of the Vacation Church School is one which every parent should take advantage of because of the splendid opportunities which it offers in character building. It is a school-conducted during the summer and has a term of long consecutive days. The daily session begins at nine o'clock and lasts until eleven-thirty. law, the director of Religious Education, will direct the work in the junior department, Miss Enid Pearce, pianist, will have charge of the music. Aside from these superintendents there will be other teachers and helpers.

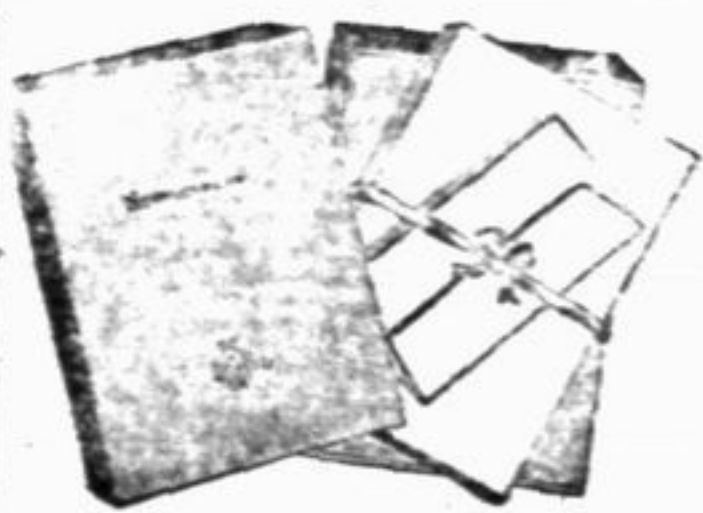
