Greeley and Hansen of the City of Chicago, Illinois, to sacertain and determine what improvements and betterments may be necessary, and to report to said Council their recommendations, together with an estimate of the probable cost of such improvements and betterments; and

Whereas, the said firm of Pearse, Greeley and Hansen has reported to said Council as authorized and directed: now, therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL

OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, prepared by Pearse, Greeley and Hansen, hydraulic and sanitary engineers, of Chicago, Illinois, for constructing improvements and betterments of the waterworks system now owned and operated by the City of Highland Park, Illinois, and submitted to the Council of the City of Highland Park, Illinois, be the same are hereby approved and sted, and at all reasonable times bereafter shall be open to the inspection of the Public in the office of the City Clerk of said city. Said rates shall not be reduced while any of the said water revenue bonds herein authorized or the interest thereon shall remain unpaid; and it shall be the duty of the Council to increase such rates whenever it appears that the revenues from said waterworks sysadequate to pay the principal and interest of such water revenue bonds as the same shall become due and to provide an adequate Depreciation Fund and to pay for the proper operaation and maintenance of such water works

Section 10. That the City Clerk be and he hereby directed to cause this ordinance to be published in the "Highland Park Press," a weekly newspaper published in the City of Highland Park, which said newspaper has heretofore been selected as the official newspaper of said City, with a notice to all persons concerned stating that this ordinance has been adopted, and that the City of Highland Park contemplates the issuance of the bonds described herein, and that any person interested may appear before the Council at a time definitely to be fixed by said Council which shall not be less than ten (10) days subsequent to the publication of such ordinance and notice, and present protests. 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
