tract and the territory close around it would be about \$2.75 per front foot in the residence district and about \$4.15 per foot in the business section.

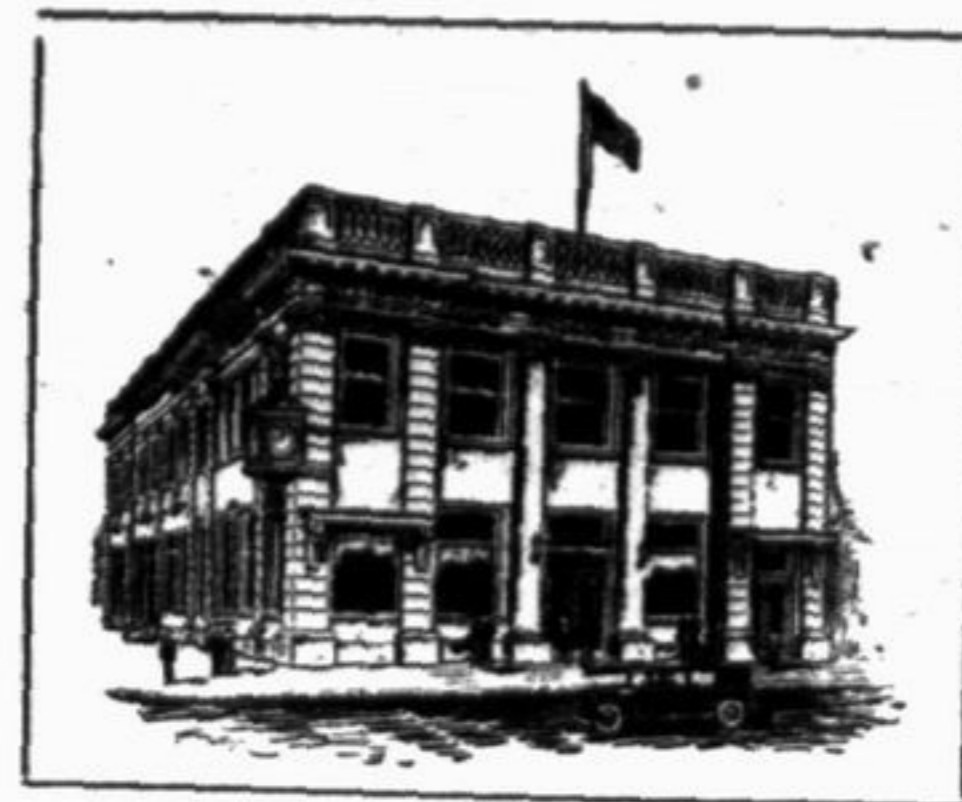
**Want People's Advice**

**Schneider-Hundley Permit**

It was moved to approve the granting of a permit to Schneider & Hundley for their building on Sheridan road and Park avenue, contingent on recommendations to be made regarding the same by the zoning appeal board, and with the understanding that the owners plan to revise their plans to comply with these recommendations. Definite details will be available when the appeal board has filed its recommendations.

The communication from E. S. Gail with reference to shrubbery on parkways was referred to Commissioner Brown.

The bill of Pearce, Greeley & Hansen in the amount of \$2,000.00 as partial payment on services rendered in connection with the engineering on the water filtration plant was approved and voucher was ordered drawn in payment of same.

The report of the Building Inspector for the month of May was ordered placed on file. Figures are given elsewhere in this paper.

**BUILDING IN CITY IN  
MAY SHOWS GOOD GAIN**

**Total Value of Permits Issued  
Exceeds \$382,000; More Than  
May Last Year**

According to the report of City Building Inspector Morris to the city council the total of building improvements in Highland Park during May, 1928, somewhat exceeded the record of May, 1927. The total for last month was \$382,700, including 20 dwellings, 18 private garages, seven alterations and three store buildings, for which permits were issued. Fees for these permits amounted to \$1,324.63. Permits for May, 1927 totaled \$309,815, the records show.
