THREE YOUNG MEN HAVE NARROW ESCAPE IN LAKE

Three students from Deerfield-Shields high school, nearly lost their lives last week when a sail boat capsized off the shore opposite the beach. As it was, one of them, Harry Richards, 17, swam for almost a mile in an effort to get help to his two companions who he left hanging on the boat with the result that he was exhausted when he was pulled from the water by Arthur Gruel, employe at the waterworks.

The two others, William McCreary, Highland Park, and John Freeman, Deerfield, tired of hanging to the boat and started to swim ashore. Freeman got a cramp and then the work of keeping him afloat fell upon McCreary.

Chief of Police Edward Maroney was called but he arrived too late to assist Gruel in bringing the boys from the water.

HIGHWOOD MAN NAMED IN DAMAGE SUIT FILED

Louis Gionetti of Highwood is named defendant in a suit for \$10,000 damages started in the circuit court by W. F. Molloy of Chicago. The praecipe of the suit, a personal injury action, was filed by Attorneys Beverly and Klaskine of Chicago, says the Waukegan Sun.

Attorney Klaskine said today that the declaration will charge that Molloy suffered serious injuries in an automobile crash caused by fast and reckless driving on the part of the Highwood man. A machine in which Molloy was a passenger was struck by a car operated by Gionetti, in Chicago, at midnight of March 9, of this year. It is charged that Gionetti failed to stop at a "through" street.

Molloy suffered severe cuts and bruises and was badly shaken up, being unable to work for a month, the bill will set forth, according to Attorney Klaskine.
