### BILLIONS OF YEARS BEHIND THE TIMES

#### ASTRONOMER DECLARES

#### Says People of Earth May Be Far From Attaining Extent of Progress Known on Planet Mars

For all our boasted progress we are billions of years behind the times! The authority for this is Dr. Henry Norris Russell, research astronomy professor at Princeton university.  
Dr. Russell's declaration comes at a period when people are momentarily away from their mundane problems to ponder what is going on within their vision but beyond their comprehension.  
A head-on collision has occurred in the sky and the star Nova Pictoris is now two stars, both of them visible in southern latitudes but not visible to the world's largest telescope at the Mount Wilson Carnegie solar observatory near Pasadena.  
Studying Stars  
Scientists who are studying the phenomenon are in South America and South Africa. They believe dispatches indicate, that the two stars mean another step in the evolution of progress of the worlds which inhabitants of this world can see but know little about, says the International News.  
Dr. Walter S. Adams, director of the Mount Wilson observatory said he did not incline to the evolution theory, the theory that another star had been born into the ether.  
"I am more inclined to believe," he said, "that there was a collision and what once was Nova Pictoris is now two stars due to Nova Pictoris splitting into two sections. This is vastly important to the scientific world."  
"The vast importance" of the phenomenon is not confined to the scientific world, amateur astronomers point out.  
"I would be more 'vastly important' to a lot of laymen if this globe should collide with a star and be split into halves, as Nova Pictoris is believed by scientists to have done.  
Perhaps, amateur astronomers were saying further, it is because of our extreme youth, even though we are billions of years old that it is difficult for us to understand many things. Their reference was to an address by

Dr. Russell, the Princeton scientist, before students of the University of California, in Los Angeles this week.  
A Young Planet  
"This is still a very young planet," said Dr. Russell. "In fact we are only now beginning to acquire the mental capacity to comprehend our own origin. Racially we are still very much in our infancy."  
Mars is the only planet on which atmospheric conditions prevail which would make any form of human life probable, Dr. Russell said.  
"If, as scientists are believing, there is life on Mars then the inhabitants of that world are in a stage of development billions of years in advance of what we know here as intelligence.  
"It is fair to assume that this world is of comparatively recent origin."  
The term "comparatively recent," laymen took to mean that this world is only a few billion years old.
